JUST A FEW FACTS RELATIVE TO THE INCREASED PRICE OF THE "JUICE"

The Increase Adds Very Little to the Cost of Operating a Motor Car, Especially Pleasure Motor -Commercial Owners Should and Will Feel the Increased Cost-May Go Higher

The automobile trade has lately become considerably excited over several advances in the price of gasoline, and some of the Metropolitan newspapers have contained columns of matter denouncing the Standard Oil Co. particularly, and all oil companies generally as baving forced the advance unnecessarily.

If the existing facts, however are taken fully into consideraion, t would be discovered that from the andpoint of the oil refiner, the dvance is not as great as might ave been anticipated.

In the first place the Standard il Co. have accused of unnecessarily advancing the price of crude oil but statistics disclose the fact that the crude oil produtcion, not only of the United States, but of Russia and Galatia as well, has been steadily decreasing, and the only increased production is in Mexico, and hat is more or less of an uncertain and a very low grade oil

ncreased prices for crude oil ot only necessary from the oint of supply and demand, was absolutely essential that producer be given all the inossible to clean out and increase the production o oold wells, as well as to seek producing territories, and there ecessarily required a very inducement, as the crop of les for several years past has ost discouraging.

During the past twelve months advanced from \$1.30 per barrel at the wells to \$2.50 per barrel of 42 gallons. Two gallons out of every barrel is lost in the refining pro cess, and therefore the 40 gallons of product which actually remains for the refiner to sell, have advanced in price \$1.20 or 3c per gallon

Out of every 100 gallons of crude oil, approximately 45 gallons are illuminating oil and 15 gallons are gasoline and the advance on these 60 gallons at 3c per gallon amounts to \$1.80.

In the past year the price on the 15 gallons of gasoline has advanced Marietta Street approximately 7c or \$1.05, while the price on the 45 gallons of illuminating oil has only advanced one cent, or 45c, making a total net advance of \$1.50, or 30c less than the advance in crude oil.

It therefore will be readily understood that although the prices of gasoline are very high, yet the refiner does not have the margin this year that he had one year ago, particularly as lubricationg oils and paraffine wax have not advanced in proportion with crude.

Sharp as the a vance in gasoline has been, it is not of very great moment to the individual automobile owner, as figuring on an average mileage of 4000 miles per annum for the ordinary plesaure car, and on the very low mileage of 10 miles per gallon of gasoline, it is readily figured that the advance of 7c per gallon would only make an advance of \$28.00 for the season's operation of an automobile. This increase in gasoline only means an increased cost in operation of from one to two and one-half per cent. and the advance n gasoline, therefore, while very sharp, and creating considerable omment, is going to make very little real difference in running of automobiles, although it will be felt more strongly by the operators of commercial cars than of pleasure
