

P. R. R. BUYS C. & L.

Looks Like an Extension of the Former to Schuylkill Valley

Announcement was made here today of the purchase of the Cornwall & Lebanon Railroad Company. The line was built in 1882 and runs from Lebanon to Conewago, twenty-two miles to the southwest, where it connects with the Pennsylvania main line. The road was purchased some years ago by the Pennsylvania Steel Company for the use of its local furnace properties and the Cornwall ore mines and this majority stock has now been sold to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, but the individual stockholders here are said to have been proffered a fair profit for their holdings if they wish to sell.

As the Pennsylvania Railroad interests are popularly supposed to dominate the Pennsylvania Steel Company, the transaction is somewhat in the line of a mere transfer, but portends the consummation of a long-felt desire on the part of the Pennsylvania Company to have a more direct connection with Reading, twenty-two miles east of here. It is believed that the purchase of the Cornwall & Lebanon property today will eventually bring about the extension of that system to connect with the Pennsylvania's Schuylkill alley line, thus making connection through Reading east and west almost direct. It was hinted today, however that the only purpose of the sale for the present is to get into harmony with the Government policy divorcing railroad lines from industrial corporations.
