MEASURES BECOME LAWS

Governor Approves Mothers' Pension and Other Acts

Harrisburg, April 29—Gov. Tener today approved the Sheutz bill providing for county systems of mothers' pensions under the administration of a commission of five to seven women, to be named by the Governor for each county desiring to avail itself of the provisions of the law. The trustees are to investigate all cases, and may recommend payments to any abandoned mother or widow who is unable to maintain her children at home. Payments are to be made monthly, and the combined maximum payment shall not exceed \$12 per month for one child, \$20 a month for two children, \$25 a month for three children and \$5 per month for each additional child. The bill carries an appropriation of \$200,000, to be apportioned among counties according to population.

The mothers' pension system has been in operation in four States, and has been advocated by many organizations of Pennsylvania men and women before this Legislature.

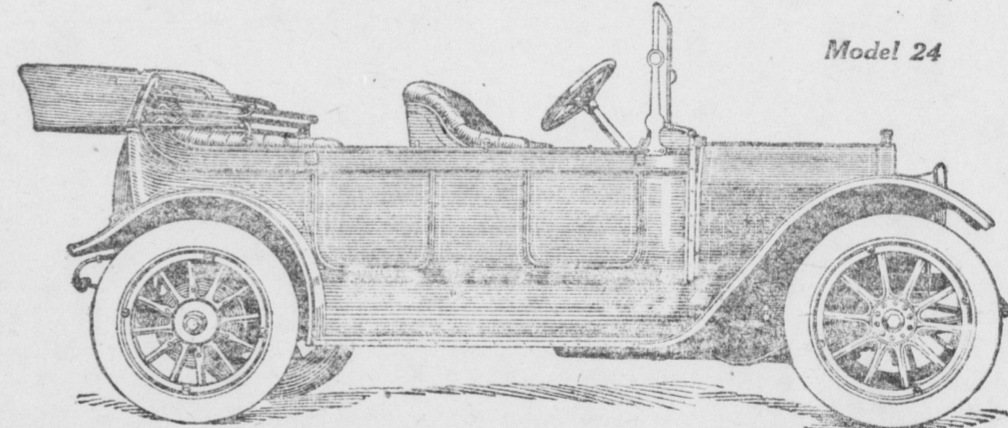
