HOME HEALTH CLUB

PURE BLOOD—In Vol. 3 of the Home Health Club books I have given much detailed information and instruction on the subject of pure blood. In a brief article like this I can only slightly elaborate a few of the foundation principles upon which the Home Health Club philosophy of good health and pure blood is built.

Now let me impress upon you, one fundamental fact which you know to be true. The food and drink and the air taken into your body is all there is to the physical part of you. Now, isn't that so? Yes. Now if some arsenic or opium or morphine or any one of that kind of poison called medicine should by accident get into your food or drink, not very much of it, only so many grains, you would die. A poison is a poison and when certain amounts are taken, no matter whether administered by a criminal for the purpose of murder or by a great physician for the purpose of cure—the result would be the same, unless antidotes are given, the person will die.

The entire process of creating the body of the baby requires only very common food, drink and air, and in some cases the variety of food is very limited, but there is plenty of air and water. These are cheap and no trust has yet been able to secure a corner upon them. With these last two elements, pure and properly used, the quantity of the blood can be increased very rapidly and so changed in its character that a test taken today at noon, would show it to be but little like another test taken 24 hours later.

This wonderful change can be brought about without the use of any drugs, nothing but pure water. If your blood is thin and your cheeks pale, try the following simple use of pure water. In a porcelain or aluminum dish, put one quart of water and heat it almost to the boiling point, as soon as a little steam rises, push it a little further back on the stove and after taking a tablespoonful of it, cover it and push it still further back. Just keep it hot, don't let it boil just hot. Put a clock near you and every five minutes during the day, except while eating your meals, take one tablespoonful. Thin medicine, yes, but it will make the most wonderful change in you if you do it just as I tell you. Don't take more, don't take less than the one tablespoonful at a time and don't take it oftener than every five minutes, but be sure you take it that often.

If you should wish to secure still more positive results and see the pink color come to your cheeks more rapidly, instead of a quart of water put into the heating receptacle one half pint of fresh, sweet rich milk and then add one half pint of water, and proceed as directed. As soon as the supply is used, have another ready or you can use two quarts in the first place if you wish. In case you use the milk and water you will not require other food for dinner and supper and the following morning I would suggest a breakfast of a dish of stewed prunes, a soft boiled egg and toast with a cup of hot milk as a finish. I wish I had the space to go on and give you the detailed information necessary in the way of diet, elimination and the additional use of pure water for making pure blood and eliminating diseased and worn-out tissues. Such studies are worth while, even for those of us who are well, if we want to keep well.

The Week in Grain
Phila., Pa., April 28, 1913.

A strong upturn in wheat prices has been the predominant feature, the rest of the grain list moving slowly upward in sympathy. Less confidence that perfect growing conditions will be maintained to the end of the season has been apparent, and in the oversold condition that existed in speculative channels has been of influence in forcing the advance. Commercially, strength abroad and continued heavy exports has been the real sustaining factor, the trade naturally more favorably disposed to the ownership of a commodity meeting such ready sale. In a domestic way there has been little to occasion buying. The milling demand could not be called better than fair, and has not fully followed the advance. Nor have cash prices kept full pace with prices for deferred delivery. With the opening of navigation the huge stocks at Duluth are moving forward, and while a considerable amount is being diverted to Buffalo, consignments to Chicago are sufficiently heavy to cause liquidation of the May delivery and prices for that month have fallen signally to follow July and September.

On the other hand stocks at visible supply stations continue to decrease in heavy amount, clearances from America are unusually liberal, the Buenos Ayres market is strong, and shipments from Argentine are falling off. Sharp competition between Liverpool and the Continent for cargoes have kept import points strong, even when prices on this side have weakened, and buying from thence been largely instrumental in checking such developments as they appeared.

While the advance has been considerable, we continue to feel that while we are in the period when crop scares may be expected to make occasional appearance, the price level is low enough to make the buying side rather the more attractive.
