Borough Council

BURGESS HOFFMAN HAS A BIG MONTH ON COLLECTIONS

G. Moyer Gets Sewer Pipe Contract—Council Refuses to Remove Water Main Across Marietta Street Bridge As Requested by Supervisor Moore

Mount Joy Borough Council met in regular session Monday to transact the regular routine business of the May meeting. All the members except Mr. Mumma, were present. Also present were Burgess Hoffman and clerk Feltenbaum.

The report of Burgess Hoffman showed collections to the amount of \$722.50, of which sum \$720.00 was hotel license money. The Burgess presented a bill of County Surveyor to the amount of \$18.50, for work done in the borough in 1907. Same was referred to the street committee to investigate and report.

An invitation was received and read, requesting Council to participate in the parade on Memorial Day. Same was accepted and the Borough Dads will be found in line.

There was a request from Mr. C. Z. Moore, Supervisor of this division of the P. R. R., to "permanently abandon" and remove the water main across the Marietta street bridge. This main was disconnected the past few years. It was unanimously agreed not to remove said main and to make the connections as soon as convenient.

The report of Mr. Drilling of the street committee was as follows: Entered into a contract with Mr. Hershey for stone. Hauled 300 two-horse loads of ashes and rubbish first week and over 200 loads last week. Received bids for sewer pipe as follows: J. H. Buhl \$24.75 per 100 feet for 12-inch No. 2 pipe; H. S. Newcomer \$22.93 and G. Moyer \$22.50. The latter was awarded the contract and the committee's action was sanctioned by Council. Will start at once to put a four inch coat of fine stone on North Barbara street. Made a survey of Detwiler Avenue from North Market to North Barbara streets and Mr. Bruhaker is now preparing a profile of same.

Mr. Barto of the Finance Committee, reported the approval of a number of bills. Among them was a bill for cutting the water pipe of Mr. Samuel C. Fissel. Mr. Barto suggested that a special note be made of this expense and in case Mr. Fissel is desirous of renewing the water service, that he bear this expense. So ordered.

Mr. Barto of the Property Committee, recommended papering a room for pumping engineer Shatz. This was ordered and also repair spouting and extend chimney on Mr. Shatz's residence.

Mr. Tyndall of the Water Committee reported subside cleaned and everything in good shape at water works.

There was no report from the Light or Ordinance Committees.

The Board of Health reported a case of diphtheria in the family of Mr. Ino. Roth on Mt. Joy street and that all the proper precautions were immediately taken.

The report of the Union National Mt. Joy Bank treasurer showed a balance of \$1,255.72 in the Borough account and \$4,249.96 in the Water account, a total of \$5,475.68 to the town's credit.

Mr. Tyndall reports a bad crossing on Weeping Alley, south side of West Donegal street. Same was referred to the Street committee to investigate and report at the next meeting. Mr. J. S. Hamaker appeared before Council with a request to lay a 7-ft. concrete pavement with a one foot grass plot on the inside. The Street committee was ordered to look up the ordinances relative to pavements and present them at the next meeting.

The invitation to participate in the Memorial Day parade was accepted and Council will turn out in a body. The Property Committee was instructed to have the Council Chamber decorated for the occasion.

After the payment of a number of bills Council adjourned.

New Church Dedicated

BY THE LANDISVILLE CHURCH OF GOD ON SUNDAY

A Beautiful Edifice Consecrated to the Worship of God on Sunday—A Description of the Handsome Bethel, Modernly-Equipped Church

Sunday was a great day in the history of the Church of God of Landisville. Seven years ago the congregation deemed it advisable to start a building fund, and on Sunday they had the pleasure of realizing their fondest hopes matured. The fine weather added to the pleasure of the occasion, and in the evening the new building was crowded to its utmost capacity.

In the morning Rev. I. A. MacDannald, D. D. pastor of the Church of God at Shippensburg, delivered an inspiring sermon on First Peter 1:16-19.

In the afternoon a platform service was held, at which time Rev. Derr, pastor of the Reformed Church at Rohrerstown; Rev. Leidig, pastor of the Lutheran Church, of Landisville, and the following ministers of the Church of God gave five-minute addresses: Rev. C. D. Rishel, of Mount Joy; Rev. G. R. Hoverter, of Elizabethtown; Rev. Oscar Kraybill, of Columbia; Rev. J. W. Gabel, of Smithville; Rev. Charles Sayers, of Central Manor; Rev. I. A. MacDannald, of Shippensburg. Rev. J. W. Deshong, of Lancaster, was also present.

In the evening Rev. S. G. Yohn, D. D., of Harrisburg, editor of the Church Advocate, delivered a forceful sermon on St. Matthew 16:24. At this service Rev. MacDannald read a portion of Second Chronicles, the sixth chapter, and Rev. Hershey, pastor of the church, offered the dedication prayer.

The building occupies a prominent site on the hill opposite the township High School. It is built of red pressed brick, upon a foundation of brown sandstone and has brown sandstone trimmings. With the exception of a massive tower, the external appearance is rather plain. The redeeming feature is the beauty of the interior. The floor of the vestibule is tiling, and the sides are wainscoted with art marble, the casing of the doors also being of marble. The building is 80 feet long by 56 feet wide and the space is equally divided into a church auditorium and Sunday-school room.

The Sunday-school department consists of a main room and four class rooms and a library. The wood finishing is of beautifully-grained oak. The church auditorium is unique. The ceiling is broken by four beautiful arches and adorned by plaster of paris moulding. The three arches in the front are supported by six massive marble columns. The pulpit platform occupies the space in the centre arch. The choir platform is to the left, and under the arch to the right is a beautiful baptismal pool, made of marble and screened in the rear by beautiful art glass. Three large art glass windows, together with twenty-four smaller ones, light the building very effectively. The entire basement is finished nicely and cemented. One part is served as a kitchen is supplied by a stove and lavatory. Two toilet rooms also occupy a space in the basement. A well over eight feet deep furnishes excellent water. The building is heated by steam and lighted by electricity.

Including the ground and labor donated, the building costs about \$21,000. Of this sum, \$13,000 was paid in before the dedication. Rev. I. A. MacDannald very pleasantly and successfully conducted the financial campaign during the day, and by the end of the day \$5,500 was secured in cash and pledges. The members of the church, the pastor and the building committee feel gratified with the results, and appreciate the interest taken by their many friends in the new Bethel.

The day was a double anniversary for the pastor, Rev. H. S. Hershey, as it began the tenth year of his pastorate.

All the members of the Church and the community are to be commended for the faithful manner in which they performed their duties, and the building is a monument to their Christian industry and integrity. The building committee was composed of H. C. Greider, S. B. Minnick and H. S. Hershey.
