Peter J. Schauen died at Columbia Thursday aged 68 years. Tobias Herr of Manheim township, died Thursday aged 73 years. Mrs. Annie Burkholder of Bainbridge and Mrs. Hettie Miller of East Petersburg, are daughters of the deceased.

Anna L. Ober  
Anna Leta Ober, daughter of Mrs. Jacob Ober, died on Thursday night. She had an attack of measles and this developed into St. Vitus' dance. She was in her thirteenth year. The funeral was held on Monday afternoon with services at the Reformed church at Manheim.

Ira Shank  
Ira Shank died at the home of his parents near Rheems on Wednesday afternoon after a continued illness of several months. He was twenty-four years old, and is survived by his parents and one brother Sylvester. Funeral services were held on Saturday at the Reformed Church in Elizabethtown, and interment was made in Mount Tunnel Cemetery.

Morris Shonk  
Morris Shonk, aged 18 years, died last Monday at the home of his grandmother, Mrs. Susan Swade at Milton Grove. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the house and at 1:30 at Chiques meeting house. Interment was made in the cemetery adjoining.

Benjamin F. Swarr  
Benjamin F. Swarr died at noon Wednesday from general debility at the home of his son-in-law, Harmon H. Long, at Landisville. The deceased was eighty-six years of age and was a member of the Reformed Menonite church. Three years ago he sustained a stroke of paralysis. He was born in the vicinity of Landisville and lived there all his lifetime. He was a farmer by occupation, but lived retired for a number of years. His wife, who was Mary A. Lehman, of Rohrerstown, died sixteen years ago. These children survive: Lillie A., wife of Harmon H. Long, Landisville; J. Lehman Swarr, Mount Joy; Milton O. Swarr, Lancaster; Harvey H. Swarr, Philadelphia; E. Adele, wife of Irving Heikes, New York City; Dr. B. Franklin Swarr, Lancaster; and Mary A., wife of John J. Fabre, Oradelle, N. J. Brief funeral services were held from the house on Saturday, with further services at 2 o'clock in the Reformed Menonite church at Landisville. Interment was made in the adjoining cemetery.

Dr. Elmer E. Brown  
Dr. Elmer E. Brown, vice president of Temple University and a widely known business man, died at his home, 1415 Tasker street, last night, from uraemia, after an illness of two months.

Doctor Brown's health began to fail early in April, and he took a trip to Bermuda, from which he failed to derive any benefit. He continued to grow worse steadily and never recovered from the first attacks.

Dr. Brown was born May 6, 1861, at Rising Sun, Md. His father died of wounds received in the Civil War, and the lad was sent, at the age of 11, to the Soldiers' Orphan School at this place, where he remained until he was 18 years old. After leaving school he went to Baltimore and later to Washington, D. C., where he was in the commission business.
