## Sixteen Graduate

Largest Class in the History of the Borough

MISS RUTH F. SPANGLER THE VALEDICTORIAN

Eleven Ladies and Five Young Men Receive Diplomas—Dr. George P. Bible of Philadelphia, Delivers the Formal Address—Class Roj

One of the unusual features in connection with the borough High School commencements in the county this year is the large number of graduates that compose the Senior classes. In some instances records have been broken. This was the case here, when the twenty-sixth annual commencement was held on Thursday evening. Here the class numbered sixteen, eleven ladies and five young men, as follows: N. Esther Reist, May B. Flowers, Ruth Bowman, John L. Murphy, Sara S. Kramer, Tekla Bube, F. Marie Klugh, Roscoe G. Every seat in the Hall was occupied when the exercises opened. The stage was effectively decorated with plants and flowers, pennants in the class colors, blue and white, and the class flower, the cream rose. The graduates' motto was "Non sibi sed aliis." The programme carried out was as follows: Overture, orchestra; invocation, Rev. J. T. Spangler, D. D.; essay, "Home and its Queen," Tekla Bube; salutatory, "Is Poverty a Curse?" Anna R. Engle; piano solo, "The Last Hope," (Gottschalk) Bernard W. Ebersole; class poem, Rebecca A. Helman; essay, "The Value of a Practical Education," Mary M. Stauffer; overture, orchestra; valedictory, "New Emphasis on Humanity," Ruth F. Spangler; presentation of diplomas, Mr. G. Moyer, President of the School Board; overture, orchestra; address, Dr. Geo. P. Bible, A. M., Ph. D., National School of Oratory, Philadelphia; class song; benediction, Rev. Frank G. Bossert.

The Salutatory  
Miss Anna R. Engle had the salutatory. In extending a welcome to the audience she took occasion to say:

We must now enter upon the greater field of life, which lies stretched out before us. We must cast away our high school privileges and pleasures, only to hold them with the firm grasp of our memories and assume the graver burdens that beset us as we leave the threshold of a high school so dear to us. Our equipment is good, our armor is strong; so let us meet our worldly battles face to face, remembering that a nation looks to high schools and colleges for men and women of brains. Both nature and destiny are honest. To the future they grant the spoils. We go forth like members of a great family, always ready to help one another and never forgetting to honor our Alma Mater.

Poverty, accepted as a dispensation of providence, is not a curse, but may be made a blessing. Work in youth will give zest to repose in age. Experience of poverty will teach us to be considerate and charitable to others when by energy and industry we have earned the power to give from our own supply of worldly comforts.

The Valedictory  
"New Emphasis on Humanity" was the subject of the valedictory oration, which was delivered by Miss Ruth F. Spangler. In part she said: Gradually there has come to our civilized lands the conviction that there is no production so valuable as man. As civilization advances and living becomes more real, forethought for others—even those not yet born—seems to occupy every phase of social development. Has it not been the aim of our great men to do something which would result in great value to the world? The world is at last beginning to see the value of humanity, and the conditions of life and life itself are being more deeply considered today.

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## MEMORIAL DAY

A Fine Parade in Which There Were Three Bands

Last Friday, Memorial Day, was one of the big days in Mount Joy. The town was appropriately decorated and there were an unusually large number of visitors here. The weather was threatening, drizzling rains at frequent intervals throughout the day keeping the crowd down.

In the morning the members of the G. A. R. and S. of V. decorated the graves of the old soldiers in the Camp Hill, Lincoln, Eberle and Mt. Joy cemeteries.

In the afternoon the parade formed as stated in these columns last week and marched over the main streets of the town. Upon returning to the park the following program was rendered:

In the evening, at seven o'clock the Spring Garden Band was to give a concert in the park. The weather was so threatening that they were obliged to play in Mount Joy Hall. The hall was packed, many being unable to gain admission. After rendering a few numbers the weather looked favorable and the concert was finished in the park during a drizzling rain. The music was well rendered and more than pleased.

### Benjamin Mishey, A Well Known Resident, Dead

THE ROAD WHICH WE ALL MUST TRAVEL SOONER OR LATER

One Well Known People From Our Neighborhood Have Passed to the Great Beyond Since Our Last Issue Go to Their Reward.

Mrs. Elizabeth Scholl, widow of Solomon Scholl, former residents of this place and well known here, died at Lancaster in her 92nd year.

Benjamin F. Mishey—Born Sept. 3, 1835—died June 2, 1913, aged 77 years. Funeral from his late residence on W. Donegal St., Friday, June 6, at 2 o'clock. Please omit flowers.

Mrs. Rebecca Stoll, widow of Martin Stoll, died at the home of her daughter Mrs. H. G. Hagenberger, in this place, Saturday evening. She was aged 86 years, 8 months and 14 days. Death was due to infirmities incident to old age. Deceased was a member of the United Brethren church for 65 years. These children survive: Mrs. H. S. Hagenberger of this place, Mrs. Andrew Sumpman of near Florin, Martin Stoll of Salunga and Samuel Stoll of Victoria, Texas. The funeral was held from her late home, Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock with services by Rev. J. T. Spangler.

### Miss Freda J. Miller

Miss Freda Joanna Miller, daughter of the late Charles Miller, died at the home of her step-father, Mr. Martin A. Spickler, last Wednesday evening. Deceased was in her twenty-third year and death was due to a complication of diseases. Miss Miller had been ailing for some time but her illness was not considered serious until shortly before her death. She was very well known throughout this community and leaves a large circle of friends. Her mother, Mrs. Martin A. Spickler, survives. She was a member of St. Mary's Catholic Church of this place. The funeral was held Saturday morning and was largely attended. Interment was made in the Mt. Joy cemetery.

### Benjamin F. Mishey

Benjamin F. Mishey was born at Newburg, Cumberland Co., Pa. Sept. 3, 1825, and came to Mount Joy in 1849, making his home with "uncle" Lewis and "aunt" Sue Brady. He learned the moulding trade in the iron foundry of Mr. Brady and when the Bradys finally retired from business, Mr. Mishey, together with Harvey Bookmyer and James Youtz, assumed control of the business under the name of Bookmyer, Mishey and Youtz, continuing in business at the west end of town, where the gas works are now located. In 1871, their plant together with a number of other works were completely destroyed by fire. The same firm rebuilt what is now known as the Rollman Manufacturing Co., but after passing through an iron panic, they discontinued business and Mr. Mishey, after working in several occupations in Mount Joy and Lancaster, finally located with the Mount Joy Gray Iron Co., continuing with that Company until his retirement from business about 8 years ago.

He has always been active in church and Sunday school work, formerly being connected with the Church of God and later with the Presbyterian church of this place. He was superintendent of the Presbyterian Sunday school for a number of years and there are many of the Sixteeners who will recall his active interest in religious matters at the Soldiers' Orphan School.

He served with Company E, Fourth Regiment Penna. Vol. Militia in 1862. He was a charter member of the Lodge of American Mechanics and a member of the local lodge of Odd Fellows, almost dating back to the Constitution of the lodges in this borough.

He married Elizabeth, daughter of George and Elizabeth Hoffmaster of Chestnut Hill, this county, and on January 4th of this year they celebrated their 58th wedding anniversary.

His widow, the Misses Sallie and Jessie A. Mishey and Milton B. Mishey, all of this place, survive.

## ELECTED TEACHERS

Prof. C. E. Roudabush Was Re-elected Principal

The Mount Joy Borough School Board met on Monday evening and had quite a busy session. Every member was present. The school term was fixed at nine months for the High School and 8 1/2 months for the grades. This is an increase of two weeks for the latter.

The tax rate was fixed at seven mills, same as last year and the principal and all the teachers' salaries will be the same. The schools will open the first Monday in September. Mr. Jno. H. Wharvell was re-elected janitor at the same salary.

There are but two changes this year. Miss Aumiller, who succeeds Miss Kuhns, is a daughter of Prof. Aumiller, principal of the schools at Elizabethtown. Last year she was the second assistant in the High School at Lititz.

Miss Eva Kreider, who succeeds Miss Martin, who was promoted from the Fifth to the Seventh room, is a resident of Florin. She is a graduate of the Mt. Joy High School, Class of 1907, and also of the Millersville State Normal School. The past two years she was teaching in the Joint school.

## Dedication Tomorrow

Big Time at Elizabethtown June 5th

BUILDING REPRESENTS AN INVESTMENT OF \$5,000.00

Masons From All Parts of the State Will Assemble and Assist in Dedicating the Magnificent Structure. There Will be a Number of Bands Present—Other Notes

Ten thousand or more Masons from Pennsylvania and other states will attend the dedication of the Grand Lodge Hall of the new Masonic Home at Elizabethtown, Lancaster county, on Thursday, June 5. This hall, first to be erected of the series of buildings that, with the land, will eventually represent an investment of \$5,000,000, will be used as the administrative headquarters of the homes, the general dining room, library and places for social features, as well as for the accommodation of 175 members, and the necessary employes.

The dedicatory ceremonies will be held at 12 noon. The members will assemble on and about the terrace facing the Grand Lodge Hall. In the following order, the officers of the Grand Lodge will enter the terrace: Grand marshal, grand tyler and grand pursuivant, grand stewards, grand deacons, grand chaplains, district deputy grand masters, committee on Masonic homes, past grand masters, grand treasurer and grand secretary, grand wardens, deputy grand master and grand sword bearer. The officers will assume their respective places upon the entrance of the grand master. In charge of the ceremonies will be the following officers: William L. ## Borough Council

BOND OF TAX COLLECTOR T. M. BRENNEMAN ACCEPTED

The Reservoir Was Ordered Cleaned—Board of Health Reports Another Case of Diphtheria—High Constable Shatto Will Get a Uniform—Other Business

When President Brown rapped the gavel at Monday evening's meeting of Borough Council, these men responded to the roll call. Messrs. Dillinger, Barto and Ricksecker. Also Burgess Hoffman and clerk Fellenbaum. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

A lengthy explanatory communication relative to a bill due him since 1907 was read from Mr. Wood, a surveyor in the lower end of the county. In part he said: "He was ordered by the late M. L. Greider, then a member of Council, to do some surveying on Appletree Alley. Mr. Clarence Schock was at that time erecting elevators. After making the surveys he found that Mr. Schock's elevators were partly erected on ground that comprised said alley. Mr. Wood was then told that a suit would follow relative to the matter and that he should hold his bill which would be included in the damages. He said there was no suit. Mr. Greider had since died and if the Borough felt as though it didn't owe the bill he would play the part of the good Quaker, by doing without it. The bill amounting to \$18.30, was then paid.

An invitation from the Jr. O. U. A. M. to participate in the parade on June 14, was read and it was decided not to parade.

The report of Burgess Hoffman showed collections to the amount of \$3.75 the past month. He presented the bond of tax collector T. M. Breneman to the amount of \$7,400, with H. W. Hartman and Joseph T. Breneman as sureties, was read and accepted.

Mr. Hoffman suggested that Council purchase a uniform consisting of trousers, coat and hat for the High Constable. He was ordered to purchase it, the cost not to exceed \$25.00.

Also asked to have the fire engine tested a day or so prior to cleaning the reservoir. So ordered.

Mr. Dillinger of the Street committee, reported sewer completed on Old Market street, West Donegal street being repaired and are now working on same street eastward, all ashes hauled and streets cleaned, supervisor is cleaning gutters and that after investigation recommends laying a new crossing across Weeping alley on the south side of Donegal street. So ordered.

Mr. Ricksecker of the Water committee, reported everything in good order. Mr. Brown also reported grass and weeds at reservoir cut, fence whitewashed and recommended cleaning the basin some time this month. The committee was ordered to clean the reservoir when it sees fit and to properly advertise it.

Mr. Barto of the Finance committee, reported the approval of a number of bills.

Mr. Hoffer of the Board of Health reported the case of diphtheria in the home of Jno. Roth convalescent and reported a new case at the home of Mr. John Zerphey, his wife being the unfortunate one.

The report of the Union National Bank treasurer showed a balance of \$85.59 in the Borough account and \$4,144.75 in the Water account.

Mr. Clinton Eby asked permission to connect another of his houses outside the borough limits with the water main. Same was referred to the water committee.

A number of bills were paid and Council adjourned.
