Annual Event Will be Held Here on Saturday

CANASATEGO BAND OF LANCASTER WILL LEAD PARADE

The Lancaster County Association Junior Order United American Mechanics Will Hold Three Sessions Here Next Saturday, June 14.

The biggest event of the season will be the Junior Order United American Mechanics County Convention to be held in this place on Saturday, June 14.

The Lancaster County Association, composed of sixteen orders, will hold an all day session in Mount Joy Hall. The first session will be held at 9 A. M., the program being appended:

Public Session—Singing, Opening Ode; Prayer, Rev. I. H. Kern; Address of Welcome, Rev. C. D. Rishel; Response, Pres. J. C. Kiehl; Music; Address, V. Pres. J. F. Leisey; Prayer, Rev. J. T. Spangler; Adjournment for Executive Session.

10:00—Executive Session, Selection; Prayer by Chaplain H. M. Metzger.

The meeting will convene at 1:30 and hold an executive session. At 1:45 there will be a selection and prayer by the Chaplain and at 3:30 will adjourn for the parade.

This will undoubtedly be one of the biggest parades ever held in this town as all of the sixteen societies have expressed a willingness to participate. There will be at least six bands and possibilities are that several other orders will bring bands with them. The bands to participate at this writing are: Canasatego, of Lancaster; Millersville Band, Mountville Band, East Petersburg Band, Elizabethtown Band, and the Foresters Band. The first named will lead the procession.

Mr. H. C. Schock will be chief marshal and will be assisted by these aids: Messrs. Ed. Ream, Dr. O. G. Longenecker and C. N. Mumma.

The parade will form on West Main and Market streets, and promptly at four o'clock move over this route: West Main to Marietta, west on Marietta to New Haven, to Manheim, to Old Market, to Frank, to Barbara, to Mt. Joy street, to Jacob, to Main, to Barbara, to Columbia Avenue, to Delta, to Donegal, to Lumber, to Main and east on Main to Barbara, centermarket at Exchange Hotel and return to Hall. This is the longest march ever given any parade in this town.

All the school children are requested to assemble at the school grounds promptly at 3:15. Wagons will be provided for them.

All the State officers have expressed a willingness to attend the sessions. Immediately after the parade there will be a game of ball.

Lineman Electrocutted

Addison Lemon Aged Forty-Seven, The Victim

TWENTY-SEVEN HUNDRED VOLTS PASS THRU HIS BODY

He Came in Contact With a Live Wire While Working on Pole Near Home of Samuel Eyer in East Donegal This Forenoon.

Mr. Addison Lemon, a lineman in the employ of the Edison Electric Company, met with an accident today which resulted fatally.

He was one of Foreman John Simmaker's gang. The men are rebuilding the feed line that leads from Marietta to Elizabethtown, along the Coobrook road. Today they were working along the Cameron farm, tenanted by Mr. S. H. Tressler, and near the residence of Mr. Samuel Eyer.

Mr. Lemon was at work on a pole, he was standing on his climbers and had a safety strap around his waist and the pole. He wore rubber gloves as do all the linemen, but in some manner his left elbow came in contact with a high tension feed wire carrying about 2700 volts. In his struggle his neck and shoulder also came in contact with the wire. At all points where the wire touched his person, the flesh was burned to the bone.

He was rendered unconscious and slid down the pole. Fellow workmen went to his rescue but he only lived about fifteen minutes.

He was taken to the home of Mr. Eyer near where Deputy Coroner B. S. Dillinger of this place, held an investigation, and found death was accidental, in accordance with the above facts.

He was about forty-seven years of age and had been in the employ of the Company for about two months. He boarded with Harry Drybread at Hotel Marietta in Marietta. A sister lives at Lancaster.

Undertaker H. C. Brunner of this place, will bring the body to his undertaking parlors, where it will be prepared for burial.

Abraham I. Gram died at Columbia on Saturday aged 78 years.

George Hippy of Columbia, died on Saturday morning aged 76 years.

Mrs. Frances, wife of Ephraim Gatz of Columbia, died at the county hospital from tuberculosis. Deceased was twenty-eight years old.

Mary Eby
Mrs. Mary Eby, a widely known resident of near Strickler's Church in Rapho township, died last Friday aged 90 years, 6 months and 9 days. Death resulted from infirmities incident to old age. She leaves these children: Hettie and Eli at home; Henry Eby of Florin and John S. Eby of this place. A half-sister, Mrs. Caroline Whitman of Bismarck, also survives. The funeral was held from her late home Sunday afternoon at one o'clock and at two o'clock at Strickler's Church. Interment was made in the adjoining cemetery.

Henry Reiff
Henry Reiff, the oldest member of Mount Joy Lodge, No. 277, I. O. O. F., died at Fostoria, Ohio, June 4, 1913. He was born in Rapho township ninety-two years ago. He was initiated as a member of the order May 5, 1849, and kept himself beneficial all this time. He received funeral benefits on the death of his wife in 1885. He drew no sick benefits until 1895, when he received \$160.00, and then was not sick for ten years, but from 1903 on he received \$774.00 benefits.

John Myers
John Myers, the oldest resident of Bainbridge, died on Wednesday of a general breakdown, in his ninetieth year. He was engaged in the mercantile business and also carried on farming until a few years ago, when he retired. Mr. Myers served in the 195th regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteers, during the Civil War. In politics he was an unflinching Republican. He voted for John C. Fremont in 1856 and every candidate of the party since. His wife, who was Catherine Houck, died sixteen years ago. The following children survive: Melissa A., wife of ex-State Senator W. S. Smith, of Bainbridge; Margaret H., widow of Louis Umland, of Harrisburg; Viola J., widow of Samuel B. Trimble, of Tonawanda, N. Y.; ex-Sheriff John H. Myers, of Lancaster; Cathryn J., wife of R. A. Hummel, of Bainbridge; Emma B., wife of George B. Embick, of Harrisburg; and Grace A., wife of Orr Bachman, of Bainbridge. The funeral was held on Friday afternoon with interment at Riverview cemetery at Bainbridge.
