TAX COLLECTOR BRENEAN RIGHT MAN IN RIGHT PLACE

The Ordinance Authorizing an Extension of Time on the Water Works Debt Unanimously Passed by Council—Thirty Years Extension—Bonds Four Per Cent

Mount Joy Borough Council met Monday evening at eight o'clock with President Brown, and Messrs. Dillinger, Tyndall and Barto, Clerk Feilenbaum and Burgess Hoffman present.

Tax Collector T. M. Breneman reported all the outstanding taxes of 1912 collected except fifty cents, that being due from Mr. William Michael and he is not in the town at present. Mr. Breneman has thus far collected three times as much tax for this year as had any of his predecessors at this time of any year. This is quite a remarkable record.

The report of Burgess Hoffman showed collections to the amount of \$68.25 the past month.

Mr. Dillinger of the Street Committee, reported having laid a 20-ft. addition to the sewer on Apple Tree alley; laid new crossings at intersection of Barbara and East Donegal streets; cleaned gutters throughout town; Donegal street completed; Marietta street partly completed; New Haven street completed; weeds mowed and trees trimmed.

Mr. Dillinger recommended repairing the 200 feet of South Barbara street with a coat of cinder and stone. Ordered. He also recommended that the Edison Electric Co. be notified to repair all pavements where poles were reset or new ones planted. Ordered. Also that the Conestoga Traction Co. remove all surplus material stored on South Barbara street and reset several poles that are on said street. Ordered.

A low wire was reported on east side of Barbara street bridge and the Clerk was ordered to notify Bell Telephone Company relative thereto.

Mr. Tyndall of the Water Committee, reported reservoir cleaned and gave Mr. Clinton Eby permission to connect with water main.

Mr. Barto of the Finance Committee reported the approval of a number of bills.

The Ordinance Committee presented an ordinance authorizing an extension of thirty years on \$25,000 of the present \$27,000 water debt. The bonds will bear 4 per cent interest, to be paid semi-annually. The rules were suspended and the ordinance passed. President Brown then appointed Messrs. Dillinger, Tyndall and Barto as a committee to have coupons prepared and issued to present bond holders and also have ordinance printed and advertised.

Mr. Barto of the Property Committee, reported house at pumping station papered and otherwise everything O. K.

Mr. Brown of Light Committee reported all lights burning.

Mr. J. E. Hoffer of the Board of Health reported last case of diphtheria out and that he needed \$9.37 for expenses. An appropriation of \$25 was made in favor of the Board of Health.

The report of the Union National Bank, treasurer, showed a balance of \$3,668.26 in the Boro account and \$4,080.00 on the same side of the ledger in the Water account, a total of \$7,748.26 in the Boro's treasury.

Upon motion Columbia Avenue was ordered graded from Market street west to Poplar street.

Clerk Feilenbaum reported \$203.50 outstanding water rent and he was ordered to collect same as per ordinance.

A number of bills were paid and council adjourned.

FELL FORTY FEET

Mr. John Dietz Was Injured at Elizabethtown on Monday

Mr. John Dietz, who is employed by the Columbia Telephone Company, having charge of Mt. Joy and Elizabethtown, met with a bad accident at the latter place on Monday afternoon, that could easily have cost him his life.

He was at work on the top of a forty foot pole and was about to ascend when his climbers cut out and he fell to the ground. Mr. Dietz used excellent judgment in his fall. He jumped away from the pole, falling thru a tree which was the cause of him not falling to the ground so hard. Had he slid down along the pole he would have come in contact with the high tension electric light wire, the same line that killed a lineman near Donegal a few weeks ago.

Mrs. Rutt, who resides nearby saw Mr. Dietz fall and resorted at once to Mr. Wm. Guthrie, who went to his assistance. When picked up he was unconscious and remained in that state for some time. He was taken to the office of Dr. Trechler where he was given medical attention and that evening was brought to his home here in an automobile.

He sustained a bad gash in the head which required a number of stitches and is badly bruised about the back and arms. Yesterday he was able to sit up and his many friends will be pleased to learn that his injuries are not serious.
