## Automobile Upsets

### Accident Occured at Green Hills Last Night

**MRS. MOSES GARBER IS BADLY INJURED**

**Ford Automobile Goes Down a Steep Hill Backward, Upsets and is Badly Wrecked—Occupants Thrown Out and One Severely Injured**

While out demonstrating last evening, an automobile accident occurred at the Green Hills, two miles north of this place, whereby an auto was demolished and the occupants thrown out but only one badly injured.

Mr. Ed Coble, of Elizabethtown agent for the Ford automobile, was demonstrating and with him were Mr. Isaac Eshleman and his mother-in-law, Mrs. Moses Garber, and Mrs. Peter Koser, with Mr. Eshleman at the wheel, while descending a steep grade at the Green Hills, the chauffeur choked the engine. As the Ford has electric lights, when the engine stopped there was no light and the machine started down the hill backward.

When near the foot of the hill the auto went into a deep gutter and upset, throwing all the occupants out. All escaped injury except Mrs. Garber. Dr. Thome was summoned and found both lower limbs paralyzed and suffering from a severely injured spine.

The automobile, a new one, is a wreck. Wheels were broken, top smashed and the machine badly damaged otherwise.

The accident was due to the inexperience of the chauffeur.

### TOOK THE WRONG MEDICINE

**Mr. Ed. Mutzer Takes Poison for Headache Tablets**

That Mr. Ed. Mutzer, of near Erb's Mill, is still alive is indeed quite fortunate, and he could have easily caused his own death by making a slight mistake.

Last evening he came to town and went to the office of Dr. W. M. Thome where he was given headache tablets in one envelope for himself and bichloride of mercury tablets, a deadly poison, in another envelope, for his wife. On his way home he decided to take a dose of headache medicine and as it was dark he made a mistake. Both envelopes were plainly marked but Mr. Mutzer erred and took the poison. He arrived home but soon became unconscious. Dr. Thome was sent for and when he arrived the man was in a critical condition.

This morning his condition is slightly improved and he will recover.

### The Funeral of Jay Hauenstein Was Held Yesterday

**THE ROAD WHICH WE ALL MUST TRAVEL SOONER OR LATER**

Some Well Known People From Our Neighborhood Have Passed to the Great Beyond Since Our Last Issue. Gone to Their Reward

Mrs. Catharine Bushong died at Manheim, Saturday from old age.

H. L. Childs, a former resident of Marietta, died at Lancaster aged 59 years.

Joseph McMullen of Mountville, died at the General Hospital on Monday from lockjaw. He was struck on the hand while holding a drill and lockjaw developed.

Hon. M. E. Olmstead of Harrisburg, member of Congress and law partner of Carson Stamm, Esq., formerly of this place, died after an operation at a New York hospital.

Mrs. Catharine Coover, widow of Daniel Boone, died at Marietta on Sunday evening from a complication of diseases aged 80 years. The remains were interred at Twindle Springs cemetery near Mechanicsburg.

### Paul Shelly Badly Injured

Paul, the seven-year-old son of Abram Shelly, a prominent farmer residing at Mastersville, was the victim of an accident on Saturday evening that nearly cost him his life. He was trampled by a horse into whose stall he had fallen from the haymow, and the side of his face and head were crushed and his body badly bruised and lacerated.

### Mrs. Barbara Brubaker

Mrs. Barbara Stauffer, wife of Rev. Jacob N. Brubaker, died Saturday evening at 9 o'clock at her home two miles east of here. She was aged eighty years and four days, and death was due to the infirmities of old age. She was a member of the Old Mennonite denomination, and is survived by her husband, Bishop Jacob N. The funeral will be held from the home of his brother-in-law Ephraim Lewis, at Kinderhook, tomorrow afternoon at 1:30 o'clock and from the Kinderhook church at 2 o'clock. Interment will be in the adjoining cemetery.

### Jay Hauenstein

Jay Hauenstein, a well known young man of this place, died at his home on West Main street on Saturday after a long illness, death being due to tuberculosis. Deceased was a tool-maker and was obliged to quit work about a year ago. Later he went to Mont Alto where he remained three months. In May he returned home and since then was living in a tent at his home on West Main street. He continued to grow weaker until death ended his suffering. Deceased was in his 28th year. He was twice married. One daughter, Theima, of Orrville, Ohio, survives from his first marriage. His second marriage was to Mrs. Lillie Fritz of this place, who survives. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. L. Hauenstein and several brothers and sisters also survive. Deceased was a member of Court Mt. Joy No. 228, Foresters of America. The funeral was held at 9:30 yesterday forenoon from his late home. Interment was made in the Ebersole cemetery.
