TATTING AND CROCHET

FINE WORK THAT EVEN BEGIN NER MAY FASHION.

Directions Given Here, Faithfully Followed, Will Result in Satisfaction—Trimming Is to Be Worked With Two Threads.

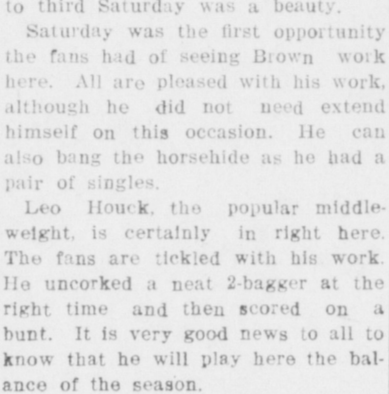
This trimming is worked with two threads. Commence with the semi-circle worked on the two threads, 7 double knots, 1 picot, 7 double knots, 1 picot, 7 double knots, draw the knots up rather closely together; for the first closed eye on one thread, work 8 double knots, join to the thread from the beginning of semi-circle, 7 double knots, 1 picot, 1 double knot, close; 2 double knots, join to first picot of last closed eye, 2 double knots, 4 picots each separated by 2 double knots, 3 double knots, close; on the second thread work 8 double knots. For the first of three large closed eyes, work 4 double knots, draw through picot of last closed eye;

NEW MARRIAGE LICENSE LAW

No Licenses Saturday Afternoons is One of the Changes Involved

Today the new eugenic marriage license law will go into effect in this county and hereafter it will be necessary for both the woman and the man applying for the license to appear, answer the questions and swear or affirm to their answers. B. Frank Musser, orphan's court clerk, has had application blanks prepared from copy supplied by State Health Commissioner Dixon, and they will be ready for distribution today.

Under the provisions of the law whenever the clerk of the orphan's court is not satisfied that the parties applying for a marriage license are fit persons to marry he is authorized to immediately certify the application to the judge of the orphan's court, who is directed to pass upon the case.

No marriage licenses will be issued by the clerk after noon on any Saturday, as no time will be afforded to have the matter passed upon by the judge should the case require certification.
