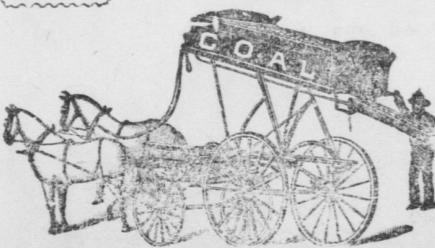

## Farmers Column

**A Principle That is Worth Remembering—Cloveur Bloat in Stock—The Pedigree of the Stallion—The Dairy Barn—The Horse—Other Notes**

Sympathy goes a long way in getting best results from dairy cows.

The curry comb will do much to help the feed in improving the appearance of the herd.

Milk scales and the tester will be a certain standard by which the cows may be measured.

The calves should have a good growing ration if they are expected to grow into large cows.

Hurrying the cows when handling or driving them does not stimulate the milk flow but rather has the opposite effect.

The greater the variety and the richer the feeds given cows, the more and better manure can be had from the herd.

The cow is a machine and a producer that can be made to do a great deal toward enriching her owner if properly handled.

Put the grain through the fanning mill before feeding it to the horses. It will not only mean a cleaner, healthier ration for the terms, but the grain that passes through them will not be full of noxious weed seeds to be carried to the field with the manure, where they propagate countless numbers of weed pests next season.

A good way to keep a horse clean in the stable is to clean out all dirt, etc., and then cover the floor about three or four inches thick with dry sawdust, as far back in stall as the horse usually stands, then cover the sawdust with straw, or bedding that you may use. The sawdust will absorb the moisture, and therefore make the other bedding last longer in case it is scarce. The sawdust should be replaced by fresh occasionally.

Dr. Marshall, a Pennsylvania institute speaker, says that white-washing dairy barns should be done for the sake of general sanitation, but the main point in the fight against tuberculosis is the elimination of the dark stables and filthy stall conditions. When clean methods are used in the keeping of cows, he advises the use of a compound made from one pound of chloride of lime and five gallons of whitewash, which, when put on the walls and stable partitions, acts as an effective preventive of disease.

Look at the pedigree of the stallion you patronize, and if it is not issued by one of the recognized registry associations don't use that horse. Many farmers will contend that a grade horse that is a good looker is just as good for a sire as a pure bred and the expense is lighter. Some of the handsomest, soundest and most perfect horses are grades, and while they are splendid animals for use, they are unsuitable to breed to. Every grade has a yellow streak in him, and this is just as likely to show as his good qualities.

Bloat in cattle generally comes as the result of pasturing clover, though it is a fact that in some cases ordinary grass pasture will produce the same results if it is rank when cattle have not been used to it are turned in. The importance of getting cattle used to clover while it is dry cannot be overemphasized. It may be necessary in some instances to turn them in for an hour or two only during the middle of the day, and continue this for two or three days, so that the ravenous edge for the new clover is taken off their appetites. Under no circumstances should they be turned from a dry lot when they are hungry into a clover field.

The idea is all too common that the essential principles of dry farming, so called, have value only for the farmer who is in the dry farming or semi-arid belt. This idea of frequent cultivation of the soil during dry weather to create a mulch so as to conserve the moisture present in the soil, which is the chief factor in dry farming, may on occasions of drought in sections where rainfall is usually sufficient be of the utmost value. During the present season there is little question that many fields of oats would have yielded from ten to fifteen bushels more per acre had the field been harrowed following the late May rains, in mid-afternoon before the grain reached ten inches in height. As it was, the last heavy rain packed the soil and the sun baked it, with the result that circulation of soil, air and moisture was interfered with and the growth of the grain greatly retarded. In the case of cultivated crops, like corn and potatoes, the same principle holds—that the dryer the weather the more frequent the cultivations should be for the purpose of maintaining the dust mulch.

## The Week in Grain

Philadelphia, Pa., July 30, 1913. Excellent weather has prevailed on both sides of the Canadian line, and with the passing of the possibility of Black Dust, there has been a renewal of the selling pressure that paused in the presence of this contingency ten days ago.

The export trade for the most part has been excellent, but not upon the enormous scale that prevailed earlier in the month. The speculative demand, likewise, has been curtailed. So that the net result of the week's activities has been to the detriment of values.

In coarse grains the undertone has been stronger. Scattered showers have fallen west of the Missouri, and while it is contended that the relief is far from sufficient, it has served to bring commission houses that were holding Corn to the selling side in the acceptance of profits that were offered. Oats have followed Corn to some extent, despite the tangible evidence of a reduced yield that threshing returns afford.

Crop exports are disposed to take a more favorable view of the probable Spring Wheat yield and to raise their estimates from a week ago. In Corn everything still depends upon the weather for a month to come, but the latter part of July on the whole has been favorable. In Oats claims of extreme damage are being verified, both by estimated yields and in the threshing returns from day to day.

On a price basis the list is inviting for investment, and the present market is one to readily become oversold. We suggest the buying side, with Oats preferable.

Spurious Five-dollar Note

The discovery of a new counterfeit five dollar "Indian head" silver certificate was announced yesterday by Chief W. J. Flynn, of the United States Secret Service. The spurious note apparently is printed from crudely etched plates on fair quality bond paper, with ink lines to imitate the silk fibre of the genuine.

The Indian portrait is very poor, and on the back of the note, grass green in color little attempt has been made to imitate the lathe work. Chief Flynn said the counterfeit should not deceive the ordinary careful handler of money.

Bainbridge Boy Injured

Jacob Lichty, a 12 year old boy, residing with his parents, near Bainbridge, was taken to the Columbia Hospital Monday morning suffering from serious internal injuries and also wounds on the head, sustained by the explosion of a gasoline engine.

The boy was on the way to an island in the river to assist his father in threshing grain. He was taken to Bainbridge for medical treatment and from there brought to the hospital in an automobile. The accident occurred as the boy was leading or standing near the horses.

The casualties in New York State from the reckless running of automobiles are said to average around fifty a day. The usual punishment is by fine but as this does not seem to avail the authorities are considering a proposition to deal with them as North Carolina deals with the blind tigers—send them to the rock pile. A few administrations of that sort of justice would be likely to reduce the casualty list.
