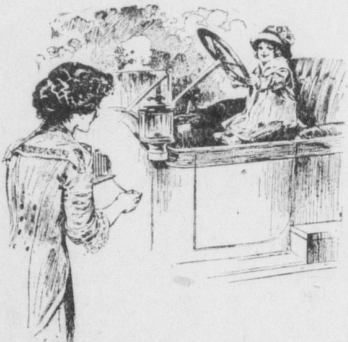

"BATTLE IN THE CLOUDS" AT

Lebanon Valley Fair Grounds—Lebanon, Pa.

The Pyrotechnic Kink's latest spectacle presents an up to date City of the year 1950 with its lofty buildings, aeroplane stations, aerial trainways, wireless telegraph towers, etc. The stage presentation depicts a holiday, celebrating a novel victory just reported, but throughout the day festivities there appears to be an underlying vein of uneasiness; a close watch is kept by the military authorities upon the horizon through powerful telescopes. The soldiers in the forts are also alert and active despite the historical pageantry and parades, the acrobatic sports, athletic contests and aerial feats of skill, that engross the attention of the people.

When night falls the festivities are at their height and the city is beautifully illuminated; suddenly the electric bulletins flash out the information brought by wireless that the enemy's airship fleet is approaching; before the joyful throngs can comprehend the meaning of this direful message and depart for their homes, the scouting vanguard is floating over the city. The forts quickly open fire upon them and with deadly aim of electric shells promptly cripple or compel the airships to best a retreat. Wireless apparatus on the scouting monsters putters its "C. Q. D." messages and soon the main fleet approaches and begins the attack. The forts reply with a terrific bombardment of fire shells, aerial torpedoes and bursting bombs, filling the heavens with fire and electric flashes and reverberating detonations. Some of the airships are disabled and leave the firing line; one explodes high in the air, and its machinery and occupants are dashed to the ground, except a few of the men who reach the earth by the safety parachutes.

These are the incidents of the Battle which is going against the besieged city and fort. The Airships have bombarded the fortifications with high explosives, fire balls and deadly gas grenades. Battery after battery has been silenced and finally the magazine is blown up. In subduing a destructive battery of noiseless guns in the highest towers in the business section, many buildings have been wrecked and fires started. The gas-bag of one airship bursts over the city and its magazine of explosives is dashed to earth, spreading destruction far and wide. Towers and buildings fall and flames add to the fearful havoc until the destruction is most complete.

HOME HEALTH CLUB

Scalp Diseases: (Part 2) This fine potash soap does not so readily make a good lather as the hard soap does, but it is sufficient with which to thoroughly saturate the hair and skin of the head with fine, soft, soothing substance. As we keep kneading it into the scalp, we find that it has a tendency to dry, which does not feel so comfortable. Without removing any of it we now take the finest almond oil and rub it into the scalp thoroughly. This brings the skin into a soft flexible state all over the head and the scalp is in first rate condition. Now, cover it all over nicely with a close fitting skull cap or other covering, that will not come off during sleep, and go to bed.

Upon arising in the morning the scalp should be well washed in warm soft or rain water containing just enough permanganate of potassium to make it slightly pink in color, or enough clear white vinegar to make it slightly acid to the taste. Either of these substances, if used in the bath, make the head or any other portion of the body chemically clean. After washing out the oil and soap rinse the head thoroughly in cold water

and dry very carefully. Unless this matter of drying the hair and scalp is fully accomplished a cold might result and if there is any doubt on the subject the skull cap should be replaced until the natural heat of the head causes the hair to become dry.

This treatment should be repeated every third night for two or three weeks, unless the good judgment of the person using it should prompt him to use it for a longer or shorter period. The first, or preliminary treatment is now under way, but only about one-half of the work is done. On the days when the above treatment is not used there must be a most thorough manipulation of the scalp for from ten to twenty minutes, twice daily. Every portion of the scalp must be deeply but gently moved in all directions with a firm pressure, not a scratching or rubbing, but a deep moving of the scalp and muscles down to the bone, so that in time the skin of the head may become as soft and flexible as that of the face. When this is accomplished there will be no complaint of falling hair, the practice of manipulating the scalp becomes an agreeable habit, which will prove very beneficial in its results, the itching will disappear along with the headache and hard drawn feeling of the head. The hair assumes its natural glossy appearance, and if it is now cared for properly it will remain as long as you do.

IMPORTANT ALLOY OF STEEL
Chromic Iron Ore Mined for Metallurgical and Chemical Uses—Production increased 70 per cent in 1912

The chromic iron ore produced and sold in the United States was nearly 70 per cent greater in 1912 than in 1911, according to J. S. Diller, of the United States Geological Survey, in an advance chapter—"The Production of Chromic Iron Ore in 1912" from Mineral Resources. The total output marketed in 1912 was 201 long tons, valued at \$2,753, compared with 120 tons, valued at \$1,629, in 1911. California is the only producing State, and the output comes from three separate deposits. Two new mines were opened, one near Livermore, in Alameda County, and the other near Piedra, in Fresno County. More chromium ore is now used in the United States in chemistry than for metallurgy, it is consumed in the manufacture of pigments, dyes, and various chemical compounds, and also in tanning light leather, rendering it tough and resistant to moisture. Most chromium pigments are very permanent. Chromium is used metallurgically in making chromium alloys and furnace linings, the latter either in the form of chrome bricks or of irregular coarse and fine fragments of chromite hammered into place without the use of cementing material.

The use of chromium in making alloys is extensive. Chromium gives to steel a marked degree of hardness, and if added in the proper proportion it does not produce brittleness. Chromium steel alone or alloyed with tungsten or molybdenum is used for making high-speed tools. It is also used in the manufacture of files, ball bearings, armor plates and armor piercing projectiles, for which it is generally alloyed with nickel, vanadium, or manganese.

The United States has never been a large producer of chromic iron ore. Its maximum annual production in 1894 was nearly 4,000 tons. Since then both the annual production and the price have fluctuated from various causes, among which the moderate demand, the pocket character and wide distribution of the deposits, and the cheap importation of ore from other countries are the most important. Production in the eastern portion of the United States, where the demand is greatest, ceased some years ago. On the Pacific coast the discovery of new and larger deposits gives promise of greater production with an increasing demand.
