The following very interesting letter was received from Rev. M. J. Bieber, who with Mrs. Bieber, is touring in Sweden at present. Rev. Bieber was a former pastor of the Lutheran Church here and is a son-in-law of our townsman, Mr. A. K. Manning.

There are beautiful churches in the magnificent Capitol City of Denmark. The hours of service are 10 A. M. and 6 P. M. There are very few Sunday Schools since religion is taught in the Public Schools and attendance is compulsory. At 8 A. M. July 20, we attended the morning devotions (Andacht) held in the Danish language daily, at our hotel (Missions Hotel). The service lasted 20 minutes and consists of a hymn, a prayer, an address, a prayer and a closing hymn. It is held in the middle one of three adjoining dining rooms and whoever happens to be present whether dining or not, and wishes, may join in the service. TRUCK WRECK

Engine Breaks Rapid Rate

No. 4, east of the "cut off," an ugly accident Sunday morning on the train at the crossing.

It is estimated something like 1000 lbs. of the engine was blown out of the track by the breaking of the axle. The pounding of the wheels on the track tore up the rails to a considerable stretch and a few to one side it demolished sixteen panels of the station.

This same fence was demolished about a week ago by an engine door of a freight car. The train was made up of Pullmans and mail cars, and it was only the heavy weight of the train that kept it to the rails. Had the train left the rails at the speed at which it was going, loss of life would have been inevitable.

The track on which the train was traveling was out of commission several hours, and the Columbia wreckers repaired the damage. People from Lancaster and points east, who wanted to go to Mt. Getz, to attend the campmeeting were three hours late in getting started, and were compelled to wait until a train from Harrisburg came down for them.

WAS STRUCK BY A TRAIN

Trackwalker Samuel H. Miller Instantly Killed Near Landisville

Discovery of a watchman's clock on the pilot of the engine, of P. R. R. train 46, upon its arrival in the Lancaster station Thursday night at 10:05 was mute evidence of an accident and later developments showed that Samuel F. Miller, of that city was the victim.

Miller was a trackwalker and it is not positive which train struck him, as Nos. 46 and 7 passed on the railroad, near the point where the body was found, west of Dillerville. It is believed that in getting off the track of 46 and was struck, Miller was hit with terrific force. His skull and left side were crushed and his left leg broken.

Upon the discovery of the clock on the pilot at the station a general search followed and it was then that the lifeless body was found. The body was picked up and conveyed to Landisville, where an investigation was held by Benjamin S. Dellinger, deputy coroner of this place and his physician Dr. Jno. J. Newpher.

Miller was a married man and has a family. He was about 45 years old.
