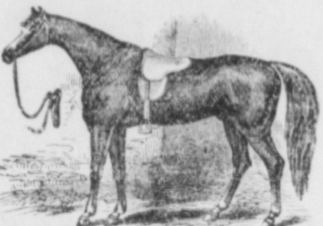

Mrs. Joseph E. Martin, wife of Rev. Martin, a retired minister of the Church of God denomination, died on Saturday morning about two o'clock at the family residence, 613 Cortlandt avenue, York. Death was due to a complication of diseases. Mrs. Martin nee Mary Buckwalter was for many years a public school teacher of this place, where she was very well known. The funeral services were conducted Monday evening at 7:45 o'clock at the Yander Avenue Church of God, York by the Rev. Harry I. Carmichael, pastor. Yesterday morning the remains were brought to Mount Joy, where further services were conducted by Rev. Rishel, a former pastor of the Yander Avenue church, and interment was made in the Mt. Joy cemetery.

Political Pointers

A penalty of \$100 fine is imposed by the uniform primary law for any one signing two nominating petitions for any one office, unless two are to be nominated.

Under the new election law the Prohibition party retains its place on the ticket, notwithstanding the fact that they polled less than 20,000 votes at the last election. The order of parties on the official ballot will be Democrat, Washington, Republican, Socialist, Bull Moose, Roosevelt Progressive, Prohibition.

A Borough may now elect a Borough Controller who shall be a competent accountant and shall have been a resident of the Borough and elector thereof for at least four years prior to his election, who shall hold his office for a term of four years and until his successor is duly qualified. This Act shall not become operative or effective in any Borough until the Council of the Borough shall, by ordinance duly passed, accept the provisions of this law. When the provisions are accepted by the Borough, Borough Auditors shall continue to hold their office until the first day of January succeeding the election of a Borough Controller, after which date the office of Borough Auditor is abolished.

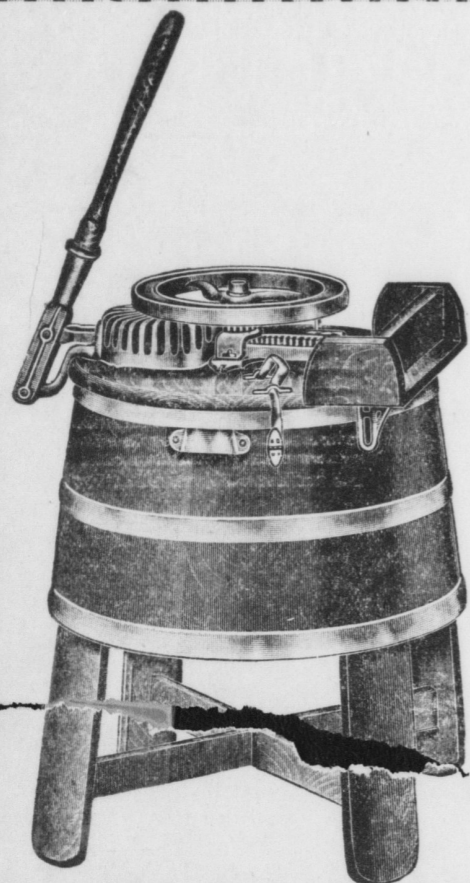
