WINTER DAIRYING PAYS

More Than Twice the Profit That the Summer Dairymen Can Make

The dairy cow of today is largely an artificial product. The application of science in breeding, feeding and care has developed her from an animal producing a few quarts of milk to sustain her young to an animal that produces sixty quarts of milk in a day.
One of the essential things in securing a large yearly record is "fall freshening," which enables the dairymen to produce a large flow of milk in winter.
The claim is sometimes made that feed stuffs are too expensive in winter to produce milk at a profit. This is all wrong, and we have only to investigate the work of the dairymen who follow all the year round

dairying to substantiate the fact that they are making the most money.
Another dairymen in the same state was conducting his dairy in a directly opposite way. This man has been shipping for several years practically as much milk in December as when his cows were on grass. He was shipping in December 250 quarts of milk per day from twenty-two cows, and his milk check for the month was \$316.
The value of "winter dairying" may be stated briefly as follows:
First—Cows produce more milk and butter during the year when they freshen in the fall because they are sure to produce a good flow of milk during the winter. In the spring fresh pastures stimulate the milk flow and keep it up through the summer.
Second—The hired help is kept employed continuously.
Third—The winter dairymen has the biggest check.

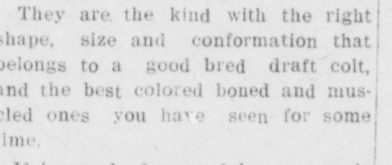
Trinity U. E. Announcements

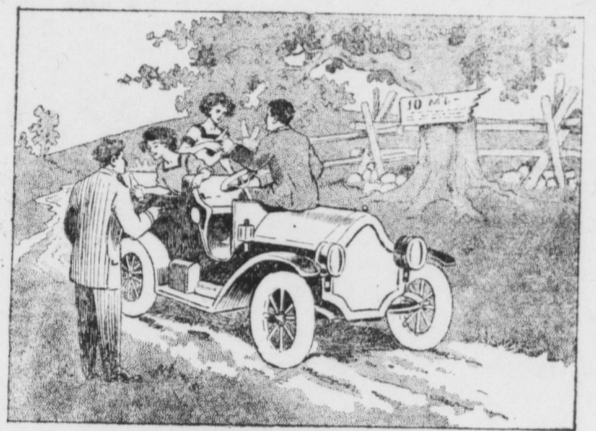

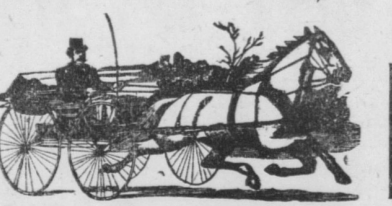
