Farmers Column

VERY VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR THE FARMERS

Care in the Buying of Trees—The Improvement of the Crops—The Care of the Dry Cow—The Ration of the Dairy Cow—Soft-shelled Eggs

Opinion is not unanimous on the advisability of removing all the milk from the udder after the calf has drawn its first meal. It is urged by those who oppose the complete emptying of the bag that only a part should be removed. The belief is that as nature's plan is only to take a little away there is less danger from milk fever than when the bag is milked clean out.

White clover hay is the richest in lime. Feeding clover is a preventive of soft-shelled eggs. Cut clover hay has helped to revolutionize the poultry business. Red clover hay contains about twenty-eight pounds of lime to the thousand pounds. Scald the clover hay at night and keep it covered so it can steam. See that the clover is cut to one half inch lengths. When longer it is apt to pack in the crop causing crop burn.

The following general facts should be observed in making up the ration for a dairy cow. A cow should be fed all that she will eat and digest well, given due consideration to the cost, digestibility and composition of the food fed. The most palatable food the greater quantity a cow will consume. Variety often increases palatability. A part of ration should be succulent in nature, as such food stimulates action in the intestinal tract, which stimulates vigor, thrift and health in the animal. Another important part of the food supply is water. Too often this is not given proper consideration.

The dry cow is easiest cared for during the time of short pasture. She does not need as much juicy food as the cow that gives milk. If she comes fresh in the late fall she can go on regular winter feed and be kept up to her normal flow all winter. In the spring she will have the fresh pasture at just the time when she needs it to keep her yield from falling off. She will give most of her milk when milk and butter are scarce and highest. She will be ready to dry off when the flies are worst for cow and cowherd. And the busy fall days will not be made busier against the necessity of milking her. What can be said against this argument?

Much has been written about the wonders of plant life produced by Luther Burbank of California. The methods he used are available to every farmer and may be used to improve your own crops. He is a careful observer and makes frequent visits to his fields with the purpose of finding some plants better than the rest. As soon as he discovers a flower, fruit, or plant better than its neighbors, he ties a string on it. This marks it and at time of gathering seed, this seed is saved separately.

When that seed is planted, it produces some plants better than others and these are again marked and their seed saved. By continuing this process for some time, he is able to develop a new strain, or perhaps an entirely new plant that is more useful than all the others of its kind. Try this method on your farm this season. You will enjoy it and profit by it, too.

When possible to do so purchase trees directly from the nearest reliable nursery firm. The propagation of such nurseries should furnish good trees at lower prices than the same goods can be bought of an agent. The honest agent whose credentials show that he is doing business for a reputable nursery is to be encouraged. Have no dealing with the unreliable tree peddler, who is abroad in the land deceiving the people with exaggerated pictures, who buys up cull stock and mixed lots of seedlings not infrequently affected with diseased root systems, who represents such goods to be some new and superior fruit, and who sells his stock at several times the price our best nurserymen ask for first class trees. Buy trees that have been inspected for dangerous parasites and look for certificate of inspection on the package before you accept it. Trees one year old from bud or graft are usually the proper age to plant, but some slow growing sorts may be two years old before planting. Under no circumstances should trees over two years old be planted for they receive a greater check in transplanting than younger trees and do not make as good growth. They are more likely to be broken in digging and packing and the cost of transportation is greater. Young trees can be pruned and trained to suit the ideals of the grower better than older trees and they will not have large branches on them.

The Week in Grain

Phila., Pa., Oct. 20, 1913. The week has been a week of liquidation in wheat such as has not been seen in years. The big shipments of Canadian wheat depressed Liverpool markets, particularly since Russia also contributed heavily to receipts at that place. The visible supply with its increase of 2 1/2 million bushels, increasing stocks in the Northwest and a prediction by Mr. Rosenbaum that the big Canadian movement would continue until navigation had closed all, aided the bears in their efforts to depress prices. The new tariff bill probably had its share in their effort to part with their wheat although there is no surety that any foreign market can under present conditions send stuff here at a profit. Some of the best informed men in the trade insist that Canada will not touch the tariff for at least two years and this view is becoming more general as time wears on. Futures declined nearly 5 cents on the week and it was not until Friday afternoon that the market showed any resistance at all. When the rally did come it carried prices up nearly 2 cents with shorts covering freely. Breadstuffs clearances of wheat for the week are 6,312,000 bushels while the predictions of World's shipments for this week are quite a little below the figures a week ago. With the present prices prevailing in wheat it will certainly show a radical change in the ideas of the farmer if he sells his wheat at this time.

Corn showed much more limp than wheat but broke badly after midweek and shows a decline of 7 cents from recent high figures. There has been a free movement of old corn to market for the reason that some believe there will not be the shortage this year that is generally looked for. Shipments to this country of Argentine corn at 5 to 6 cents under our figures laid down at seaboard influenced sentiment although really of little moment. Futures touched the lowest prices on Friday that have been seen for many weeks but there was a fair recovery on Saturday. The fact that we are coming into the new corn crop has a tendency to make bear traders more confident because they believe that no matter how short the crop there are always many farmers who are compelled to sell their stuff as soon as it is marketable. Materially higher figures are predicted after the turn of the year, with 80 cents for May corn freely talked of.

TO VOTE ON LOCKUP

At present there is no place to stow away drunks and other petty offenders and as they are quite numerous owing to the presence of foreign laborers in the nearby quarries they present a problem in municipal government of real moment. If the verdict of the polls is in favor of the lockup it will be made to break up the open carousing.

Of interest to Boarding Houses

The Legislature at its late session, passed a law defining the rights and liabilities of hotelkeepers and also including boarding house keeper sections eight and nine, thereof. This new law requires them to post in not less than ten conspicuous places, copies of sections one, eight and nine. There is not one hotel or boarding house-keeper in Pennsylvania, who has the protection of the law unless he complies with the provision of the Act of June 12, 1913.

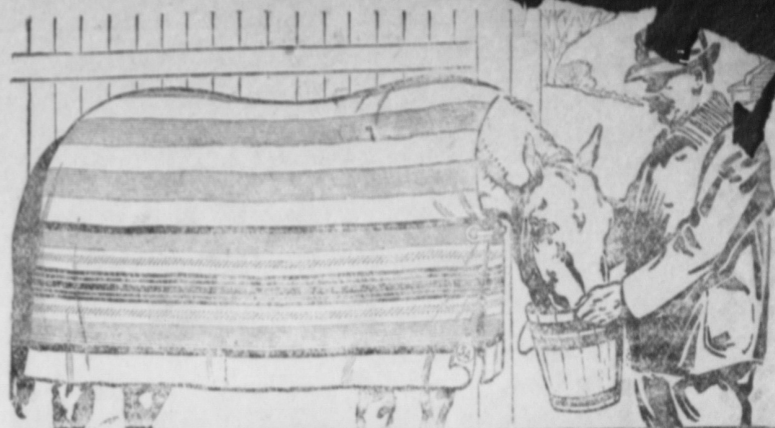
Does it Pay?
