Farmers Column

VERY VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR THE FARMERS

Care in the Buying of Trees—The Improvement of the Crops—The Care of the Dry Cow—The Ration of the Dairy Cow—Soft shelled

Opinion is not unanimous on the advisability of removing all the milk from the udder after the calf has drawn its first meal. It is urged by those who oppose the complete emptying of the bag that only a part should be removed. The belief is that as nature's plan is only to take a little away there is less danger from milk fever than when the bag milked clean out.

White clover hay is the richest in lime. Feeding clover is a pre-ventive of soft-shelled eggs. Cut clover hay has helped to revolu-tionize the poultry business. Red clover hay contains about twentyclover hay contains about twenty-eight pounds of lime to the thousand bounds. Scald the clover hay at anight and keep it covered so it can steam. See that the clover is cut to one half inch lengths. When longer it is apt to pack in the crop causing prop bound.

The following general facts should be observed in making up the ration for a dairy cow. A cow should be fed all that she will eat and digest well, given due consideration to the cost, digestibility and composition of the food fed. The more palatable the food the greater quantity a cow Variety often in consume. creases palatability. A part of ration should be succulent in nature, as such food stimulates action in the intestinal tract, which stimulates vigor, thrift and health in the animal. Another important part of the food supply is water. Too often this is not given proper consider-

The dry cow is easiest cared for during the time of short pasture. She does not need as much juicy food as the cow that gives milk. If she comes fresh in the late fall she can go on regular winter feed and be kept up to her normal flow all winter. In the spring she will have the fresh pasture at just the time when she needs it to keep her yield from falling off. She will give most of her wills when milks and butter. of her milk when milk and butter are scarcest and highest. She will be ready to dry off when the flies are worst for cow and cow-herd, And the busy fall days will not be made ing her. What can be said against this argument?


