TEACHERS' INSTITUTE OPENED MONDAY

There Are Almost Seven Hundred Teachers Present—Sessions in Martin Auditorium

Monday marked the opening of the sixty-second session of the Lancaster County Teachers' Institute, which will be held in Martin Auditorium, except today and tomorrow when sessions will also be held in the court house. By Sunday night many teachers arrived in the city and this year they will number almost seven hundred. The officers of the Institute are as follows: President, Daniel Fleisher, county superintendent; vice president, Supt. H. W. Dodd, Columbia; H. E. Gebman, Ephrata; B. F. Helges, Manheim; I. F. Seiverling, Akron; A. S. Longenecker, Lititz; Wayne R. Farmer, Denver; N. C. Norris, Little Britain; general secretary, C. D. Gehr, East Hempfield; treasurer, John Weaver, Leacock; postal clerk, George D. Uibel, Strasburg; musical director, Prof. H. T. Taylor.

The teachers began to enroll at Martin Auditorium at 8 o'clock Monday morning and this continued until 12 o'clock noon. The opening session of the Institute began at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. The opening exercises were conducted by Rev. Dr. H. A. Gerdson, of the Moravian church.

The evening attractions will be as follows: Monday, lecture by Lincoln McConnell, "Dead Lions;" Tuesday, lecture by ex-Governor Robert B. Glenn, "Our Country, Its Dangers and Possibilities;" Wednesday, Metropolitan Concert Company; Thursday, College Girls and Walter Eccles.

Much interest has been aroused over the coming of Dr. Claxton, who is the United States Commissioner of education. He will make an address on Thursday.
