THE UNION NATIONAL MOUNT JOY BANK Savings Department--Rules and Regulations

On making the first deposit, he depositor shall be present and subscribe his or her name and place of residence upon the signature card of the Bank. The acceptance by the depositor of this pass-book shall be considered an agreement on his or her part to be governed by the rules of the Savings Department of this Bank, or any amendments thereof which the board may hereafter adopt. No deposit will be received on any other condition. This pass-book must be produced each time an additional deposit is made or money withdrawn. No deposit will be received of less than one dollar. Interest on deposits will be allowed at the rate of 3-6-10 per cent. per annum, and shall begin to accrue on the first of the calendar month following date of deposit. No interest will be allowed on fractions of dollars or months, nor on accounts closed within three months after being opened. All accounts upon which no deposits or payments shall have been made for ten years, shall cease to be entitled to any further interest after ten years from the last deposit or payment. In January of each year interest payable on deposits will be added to the principal. Deposits made in the Savings Department shall not be subject to check, but the same may be withdrawn by presenting the pass-book in person at the Bank and signing a withdrawal receipt therefor. The bank will endeavor to prevent fraud on its depositors, yet all payments to persons producing the pass-book shall be valid payments to discharge the Bank. The directors reserve the right to fix a limit beyond which deposits will not be received, and to amend these rules as they may deem proper.
