She was seventy-six years of age and was a resident of Newtown for many years. Besides her husband, she leaves these children: Amos of Sterling, Ill.; Granville, of Millersville; Abraham of Washington Boro; Mrs. Emma Myers of East Petersburg; Mrs. Eva Burke of Mountville; Mrs. Elizabeth Bongart of Florin, and Mrs. Effie Mumma of Newtown. The funeral will be held from her late home on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, with services in the United Brethren church at Newtown and interment in the cemetery adjoining.

Abram C. Hawthorne Abram C. Hawthorne, who at one time was a blacksmith with more than local reputation died at his home at the toll gate on the Mount Joy and Marietta turnpike near Wolgemuth's mill, Saturday after a long illness which began when he sustained a fall about three years ago. Mr. Hawthorne was born in East Donegal and was aged 60 years, 1 month and 28 days. He established himself in the blacksmithing business at Nissley's mill but several years ago retired and became a gate keeper. Besides his wife the following children survive: Harvey and Benjamin of this place; Paris of Chicago; Mrs. David Koser of Maytown; Mrs. Ralph Stettler of Willow Street; Victor and Abram at home. Funeral services were held from his late home on Tuesday afternoon at 1 o'clock and 2:15 o'clock in the United Brethren church in this place with interment in the Eberle cemetery.

Martin M. Brubaker The many friends of Martin M. Brubaker, cashier of the First National Bank here, will regret to learn of his sudden death which occurred at his home at 8 o'clock last evening. He was feeling indisposed since last Thursday but yesterday was well enough to come down stairs for supper. Mrs. Brubaker went for the mail last evening, being absent only a short time, and when she returned Mr. Brubaker was sitting on a chair. A physician was summoned immediately but when he arrived life was extinct, death having resulted from apoplexy. He was in his 68th year. Mr. Brubaker was connected with the First National Bank here since 1866, having gone there as a clerk. He was elected Cashier in 1890 and served in that capacity ever since. He was an active member of the Lutheran Church and Sunday School, having resigned from official capacity only recently. In politics he was a staunch Republican and served as a School Director in this borough for twenty-one years. He was also treasurer for a number of years. He was also treasurer of the Mount Joy Cemetery Association many years, which office he still holds. Mr. Brubaker was treasurer of the Mount Joy Hall Association since its incorporation. He was a member of Hermit Castle, No. 66, Knights of the Golden Eagles, being its Clerk of Exchequer since its organization. He was Master of Finance of Cove Lodge, No. 301, Knights of Pythias since its organization and a trustee of Otsego Tribe No. 59, Improved Order of Red Men for many years. Besides his wife he leaves one daughter, Mrs. John K. Everitt of Jersey City, and one son Paul of Ridgway, Pa. One brother Tobias Brubaker of Lancaster, also survives.

Up to the time of our going to press, the funeral arrangements had not yet been made.
