A NAVIGABLE SUSQUEHANNA
How Many of Us Will Live to See Ocean Liners at Marietta

A navigable Susquehanna as far north as Williamsport was the hope extended to the business men of Lancaster and vicinity by Wilfred H. Schoff, secretary of the Atlantic Deeper Waterways Association, in an intensely interesting address at the Chamber of Commerce banquet in the Stevens House, Lancaster, on Thursday evening. In other words he urged the people of this community to demand a share in the development of the great Inland waterways system, the realization of which project will mean wonderful domestic commercial advantages to the nation. The speaker also declared that the Susquehanna could be made navigable by a system of locks and dams of insured permanency much more easily than the streams of the Middle West upon which millions of dollars are being spent by the Federal government and further contended that the expenditure of money for this purpose upon the Susquehanna, a river of much greater volume than many of the streams of the Middle West, would be of much greater advantage to the community than any other project.
