Borough Council Li tens To Petition From Citizens—Autoist Injured

The regular monthly meeting of the borough council was held in the council chamber on Monday evening, Jan. 17, and President Hinkle presided at being his initial session. The members present were: Messrs. Hershey, Han'ou, Holstead, Penwell, Spangler, Hinkle and McElroy.

The fire and light committees reported everything in good condition, save that the lights are burned out too early in the morning and the company is to be asked to keep them burning a little later.

The Grain Market

Country holders of wheat are selling more freely. Many of those who have been talking of the pressing demand for the hard winter and other varieties are inclined to back away from the increased supplies. The fact that the May future is held in the Chicago market by exceptionally strong hands is a help to the price. While there has been some sales of hard winter wheat on export account during the past fortnight, the business does not seem to hold up as it has been a trade wholly to fill in with. Those in the wheat trade at Chicago who switched from the bear to the bull side of the market a few days ago were to be seen on the speculative fence yesterday and undecided as to the proper move to make. While sentiment was bullish during most of last week, it was less bullish yesterday than on any day referred to. The buying power was not in evidence and the trade was largely held by professionals. Northwest receipts last week were 2,140 cars which was 300 cars in excess of the previous week, but 500 cars smaller than the corresponding week one year ago.

One of the greatest drawbacks to the corn market is the fact that James A. Patten is a dyed-in-the-wool bear and that his following has adhered to the bear side for more than a week. Patten's change of heart from the bull to the bear side of the market was caused by an almost total absence of demand for the cash article and the increase in the movement from the country.

There were \$5,520,000 bushels at western points last week compared with \$8,859,000 bushels for a like period last year. Oats have displayed considerable weakness of late, but the demand has improved somewhat and the buying has been largely by these having profits. Western receipts last week were 4,172,000 bushels, compared with 4,824,000 bushels a year ago.

The Corn Show

SPECIAL PRIZE FOR AN EAR AT LEAST 17 INCHES LONG

Show Will Be Held in Brinkman Hall February 9—Address es Will Be Made at Board of Trade in the Evening

At the January meeting of the Lancaster County Farm Bureau yesterday final preparations were made for the corn and tobacco show to be held February 9, in Brinkman Hall. The exhibits will be in Brinkman Hall in the morning and afternoon and addresses in the Board of Trade hall in the evening. The Farm Bureau was organized last March and it was decided that March 16 be the day for the annual meeting of the organization.

It was arranged some time ago by the bureau to have Mr. Holden, of the International Harvester Company as a speaker, but Mr. Holden is booked for two months ahead and it will be impossible for him to be present in his race the board asked Prof. W. H. Dorrest, of State College and he accepted. Prof. Dorrest will also act as judge. J. Aldus Herr raised the question as to whether or not the bureau should lease from the Lancaster Trust Company the room which it now occupies and the affirmative was decided upon.

Arrangements were made for the presentation of prizes at the show. The following are the classifications and amounts to be offered: For yellow dent corn, five prizes will be offered beginning at one dollar and running up to five, first prize \$5, second \$4, third, \$3, fourth, \$2 and fifth, \$1. For white dent three prizes will be offered, first, \$5; second, \$3; third, \$1. For flint corn two prizes, first, \$3 and second \$1. For mixed dent, three prizes, first, \$3; second, \$2 and third \$1. For sweet corn, three prizes first \$5; second \$3 and third \$1. For miscellaneous, two prizes will be offered first \$3; second, \$2 and third \$1. For non corn, two prizes, first, \$3 and second \$1. Other prizes have been offered by members of the bureau and will be announced later. One member offered a prize for an ear of corn that measures at least 17 inches long and has at least 16 rows.
