SIXTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF THE INSPECTORS OF THE LANCASTER COUNTY PRISON TO THE HONORABLE THE JUDGES OF THE COURT OF COMMON PLEAS OF LANCASTER COUNTY.

The undersigned Inspectors of the Lancaster County Prison, in compliance with the Act of Assembly, have made and provided, respectfully report for the year ending December 31, 1913. The number of inmates of the Prison for the past year, as per table was as follows:

Table with columns: In Prison, Discharged, Died, Total. Rows: 1912, 1913.

Prisoners for trial and hearing, 649. Convicts and cost prisoners, 196. Drunks, vagrants, trespassers, 618. Total, 1,463.

During the year 1913 prisoners were convicted (including those prisoners committed by court) being 3 less than in 1912. Deducing their entire commitments, leaves 128 offenders, being 10 more than last year. The drunk and disorderly conduct list has been increased from 272 to 629 an increase of 357. The persons charged with crime decreased from 541 to 548, a decrease of 7.

The Manufacturing Department during the year has produced as the detailed exhibits of each department show. The following are the goods: 338 yards carpet and 400 chairs made. The inventory of stock on hand, consisting of raw material, manufactured goods, prison furniture, etc., taken by a committee of inspectors, shows a total of \$7,083.48, the same being 100 per cent recorded at the prison, and a copy of the same is hereto annexed and made part of this report.

WILL DO ITS BEST. Insufficient Funds Keep State Highway Department in Check. Harrisburg, Pa., Feb. 11.—Although hampered by insufficient funds wherewith to build first-class highways throughout the Commonwealth, the State Highway Department expects to spend such money as is available in putting the highways of Pennsylvania in as good a condition as is possible during 1914. This was made clear in a statement issued by the Department this week in which the program for the coming season was outlined.

The appropriations made by the last Legislature for the purposes of road construction under the Sprout Act have been almost exhausted and the Department is now waiting a legal decision as to the moneys in the State Treasury received from the taxation of motor vehicles. The last Legislature appropriated all moneys hereafter collected from this source to the State Highway Department for use in the construction and maintenance of highways but the Auditor General has raised the point that the Legislature exceeded its powers in thus acting and that the moneys must be specifically appropriated by each Legislature for this purpose. Pending a decision on this question, the State Highway Department has been unable to obtain the money now in the State Treasury and this has delayed the laying of plans for the coming season.

State Highway Commissioner E. M. Bisel has decided that if the automobile money is made available for road work, the amount shall be used for putting in shape as many of the highways in the State as possible. It is his intention to have the roads gone over, scraped and cleaned and then to have all gutters cleaned out and repaired and to have the drains and culverts fixed. After this has been done the roads will be patrolled and efforts will be made to keep them in as nearly perfect condition as possible. It will not be feasible to proceed with much in the way of construction of new highways, since the amount of money available will not suffice to do more than keep the highways in passable condition.

The foregoing program, of course, does not apply to work to be done of State-aid applications. There remains from the appropriations made by the last Legislature a sufficient sum to enable a certain amount of work to be done on these applications made by counties, townships and boroughs, but even this amount is far below that which would be required to comply with all of the applications now on file at the Department.

Perhaps the most notable work to be done during the coming season will be that of maintenance and the Maintenance Department is planning an active year. Repair of worn-out roads and resurfacing of others where the vehicular traffic is heavy will occupy the time and labor of the Department during a great part of the season.

When the new experimental laboratory for road making materials is

established it is expected that a pared but the school of instruction for road makers to have them will form a portion of its activities. Sufficient appropriations and this, it is hoped, will result in pose by the last Legislature the transmission of a great deal of technical knowledge to the men who will be in charge of the actual construction of the highways.

The State Highway Department maps of the counties in the State are being eagerly sought for by those who are anxious to have accurate data on the roads in the various counties. These maps, which are made from surveys by the Department engineers, are of the same about the railroad stations plus charge for at the rate of from \$2.00 (train arrived)—Youngstown Text to \$3.50. They are furnished to the public by the State Highway Department at the nominal cost of 25 cents each. At the present time the Department has for sale maps of the following counties: Bucks, Chester, Clarion, Crawford, Dauphin, Delaware, Erie, Fulton, Juniata, Lancaster, Montgomery, Perry, Pike, Warren and Wyoming. Maps of several of the other counties have been prepared.
