

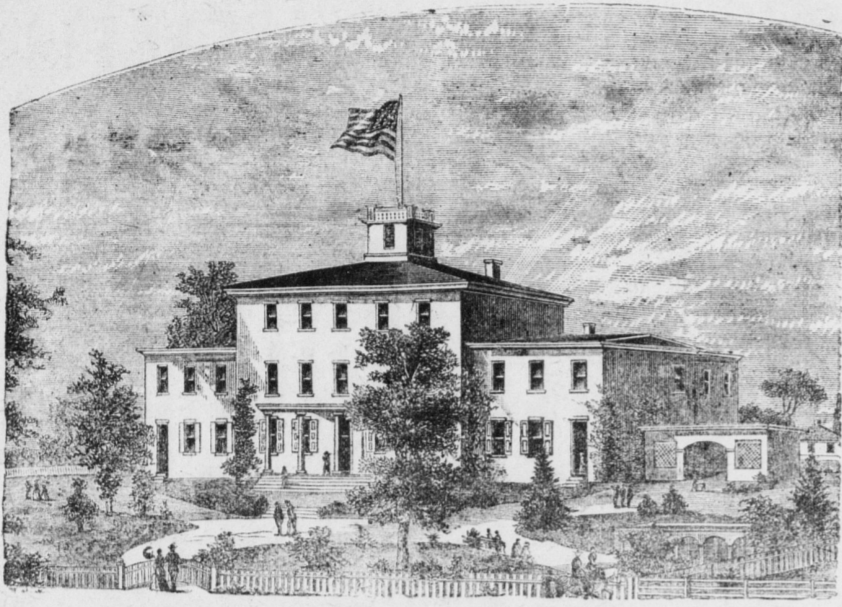

## Sixteeners' Reunion

Many Were in Attendance Here Saturday

A COMPLETE LIST OF ENROLLMENT IS HEREWITH APPENDED

All the Old Officers Were Re-elected and Mount Joy Will be the Meeting Place Again Next Year—One of the Most Successful of the 27 Reunions

On Saturday the twenty-seventh annual reunion of the Mt. Joy Sixteeners Association, or as President Kiern says, "the annual gathering of the Ex-Bean Eaters," was held in the Mt. Joy Hall in this place. Sixteeners are all former members of the Mount Joy Soldiers' Orphan School, which, until twenty years ago, was located on Barbara street, is now on the corner of B. Detwiler and is the home of families. The reunion opened at 2 o'clock in the hall, in the chair. The call of officers and Chairman of the Executive Committee showed all in attendance with the exception of Dr. C. Knowles, Chairman of Executive Committee, and Seward Chairman Membership Committee.

Minutes of session of 1912, were read and approved. The President appointed the following Committees for the work of the reunion: Trains, Messrs. John Armstrong and Herbert Brown; Auditing, Messrs. Samuel Harris and Harry Bernuth; Resolutions, Messrs. T. Hooper, C. Day Rudy, Chas. C. Hart, David W. Cotterel, and C. Knowles.

Report of the Financial Secretary for 1912 session was read, showing a surplus of 57c. and from the former giving detailed receipts and expenses, showing a balance in excess of 57c. On motion both reports were read and approved.

Resolved, that the same be spread upon the minutes of the Ass'n.

Thomas C. Knowles, of Pottsville then took charge of the memorial services in memory of our dear friend Doctor Brown, whereupon the Committee on resolutions offered the following: "At a regular Annual Meeting of the Mt. Joy 16ers Association held at Mt. Joy, Pa., February 21, 1914, the death, at Philadelphia, Pa., on May 23, 1913, of Dr. Elmer E. Brown, one of the oldest members of the Association, was announced, whereupon the following minute was adopted:

ARM TORN OFF

Oliver Eberole Crippled When His Clothing Caught in Machinery

Oliver Eberole, son of Mrs. Mary Eberole became entangled in some belting at the Kreider shoe factory, Elizabethtown, at 5 o'clock Monday afternoon and had his right arm torn entirely off at the elbow.

Young Eberole was employed in the cutting room of the factory. His shirt sleeve was caught by a belt and he was carried to the ceiling. His forearm was torn off as the belt was making the round at the top of the shaft. The limb was thrown against the wall on the opposite side of the room. Eberole falling to the floor, unconscious and bleeding profusely. Fellow-employees carried him into the main office and Dr. Treichler was summoned. He sent the injured man to Lancaster. He was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital where he was attended by Dr. Atlee. He was resting comfortably today.

Some Well Known People From Our Neighborhood Have Passed to the Great Beyond Since Our Last Issue Gone to Their Reward

Robert Daugherty Robert Daugherty, aged 46 years, died at his home in Fairmount last Tuesday, from tuberculosis. He is survived by his wife and one daughter Ellen, aged four years; also by two brothers, Jacob L. Daugherty of Harrisburg, Isaac L. Daugherty of Pottsville and one sister, Mrs. Andrew Orendorf, of Fairmount. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. James D. Daugherty, and was born in Royaltown, where he resided for a number of years. The funeral was held on Saturday afternoon with services at the house.
