Farmers Column

VERY VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR THE FARMERS

Cleanly Cows Prevent Diseases—Wheat Does Best When It Follows Corn—The Difference in Dairying—Summer Apples and Other Notes

Sick birds should be removed from the flock and dead ones burned, in an outbreak of disease.

White diarrhoea of chicks is caused by a germ which is often passed by the hen to the chick through the egg.

Vessels and troughs in which feed is placed should be frequently scalded or disinfected with five per cent. solution of carbolic acid.

It is a wise precaution to fumigate your incubator with formaldehyde before placing your eggs in it for hatching.

Be careful in introducing new birds into your flock to see that they are perfectly healthy, and not likely to bring disease with them.

The disease called "scaly legs," is caused by a mite belonging to the same family of parasites that cause mange in cattle, sheep and other farm animals.

A dusting powder for ridding birds of lice may be prepared by mixing equal parts pyrethrum (insect powder, and flowers of sulphur. Apply it with a powder gun.

Poultry diseases, just like other diseases, are favored by unsanitary surroundings, spoiled food, stale and dirty drinking water, and poorly ventilated and insufficiently lighted coops.

Summer apples were, for a long period, a minor commercial consideration, but for the past 10 or 15 years an important demand for them has developed in the eastern markets, which has greatly stimulated the planting of early apple varieties in many sections where formerly they were of little value.

Dairying is different from what it used to be 20 years ago. Today we sell butter fat and keep the skim milk on the farm and get a milk check which is real cash every week or every month. In the earlier days we used to skim the milk, churn the butter, take it to town and bring home anything the merchant let us have in exchange.

A singular fact came to the attention of farmers of the north central states during harvest time. Whenever wheat had been sown on corn land the crop was much larger than on any other soil. Investigation has shown this to be the case on so many farms that it is believed to be the universal rule. It is, perhaps fair to assume that in any scheme of crop rotation the intelligent farmer looks to the advantage of thorough cultivation before anything else. Certainly he may with propriety be so advised. But the next wise step would be to let wheat follow corn. When land plainly shows the need of a rest a couple of crops of clover, millet or Canada peas serve the purpose. The farmer who is fitting cattle or hogs for market needs corn and other fodder and he will profit in this sort of diversification, perhaps far beyond what he can gain from raising wheat. The whole argument is in favor of an intelligent diversity of crops as well as a thorough cultivation of the soil.

In the prevention of diseases too much stress cannot be placed upon the importance of cleanliness. For this reason the cows should be brushed and cleaned at least twice a week, particularly on those parts that are beyond the reach of the tongue. Whatever benefit may come from the cow licking herself when she is clean, there is more or less danger from that source when the cows are kept inside, and have no way of cleaning their bodies except with their tongues when turned out for water and exercise. At certain times during the year and at certain stages of condition and health the hair comes off in great abundance. At such times, when the animals lick themselves, much of the hair gets into their stomach and there is danger of its forming a hard mass that will severely injure them. This danger is minimized by brushing the cows carefully. It should be done daily while the cows are shedding their coats, for at this time there is more or less irritation of the skin that prompts the animals to lick their bodies more persistently than at other times. By brushing them in a careful manner this irritation is lessened and the falling hair is removed beyond the reach of their tongues.

Had Good Sales

The sale on M. B. Hestand's farm near Erismans Church last Friday was very largely attended and good prices were realized. Cows sold as high as \$120 and a calf weighing 120 lbs. sold for \$49. A heifer brought \$95 and a common red cow \$100. Thirty head of cows averaged \$82.

SMALLPOX AT BAINBRIDGE

There Are Quite a Number of Cases in Negro Family of 14

Several cases of smallpox developed at Bainbridge last week and Saturday three new cases, with a man named John Dickinson, and two children the victims, developed. These are all in the Timberlake household, a family of 14 negroes who live in a crowded dwelling house. State Medical Inspector J. L. Mowery of Lancaster, has placed the premises under strict quarantine and is taking all possible precautionary measures to prevent the spread of the disease.

The Timberlake home is a six room wooden structure and houses 14 men, women and children. All but two of the cases reported are confined to this congested household. Dr. Mowery is finding a great deal of trouble in handling the situation by the stubborn refusal of the colored residents to lend him any aid. One of the families under parole absolutely refused to take the vaccine treatment. Stringent methods will be used by the authorities to stamp out the malady and prevent its spread. Any of the paroled families who refuse to let themselves be vaccinated will be placed under strict quarantine.

The hovels in the afflicted district are all very crowded, and thus the inmates are made more susceptible to the disease. It is feared by the authorities that there were more cases prevalent, which will be found in the next few days. At the Billmeyer quarries where several cases were found, as many as four men sleep in one bunk. They are for the most part foreigners. Thus far no evidence of the disease has been found there, but all have not as yet been examined.

The outbreak calls to mind the Philadelphia epidemic which is now causing great concern among the residents of the affected district. It is rumored that the disease there may be directly traced to the Bainbridge malady. The man who contracted the disease in Philadelphia is Benjamin Banks, and is said to be a brother of Mitchell Banks the Bainbridge man who was first reported.

TOBACCO CONDITIONS

The Kimbrough Co. Will Hold Meeting at Mastersonville Saturday

Monday was the first receiving day for the Seed Leaf Tobacco Growers' Association at the Skiles warehouse and the weather was so bad that very few deliveries were made. This is the new concern headed by Kimbrough and is making quite a little progress in the lower end of the county. Last evening there was a well attended meeting held in the band hall at Maytown and on Saturday afternoon at one o'clock a public meeting will be held at Mastersonville.

While considerable tobacco has already been sold and delivered throughout this section, there are very few crops sold around Donegal Springs. Many crops await the buyers throughout that section and we presume the dealers will make a general clean-up in that community as soon as the roads are passable.

PEACH BUDS ARE FROZEN

Local Fruit Crop Doubtless Crippled By Cold Weather

It has been definitely ascertained thru reports from various sections of the county that the local peach crop this year will be a failure because of the extremely cold weather which prevailed in this section during the middle of the week. Many of the largest fruit growers of the county, as well as those in other parts of the state, have examined the buds on their trees and report that most of the peach buds show signs of having been killed by the zero weather. In most cases the fatal black spot, indicative of the bud having been frozen, appears, and there is little hope for anything like a good crop. This will be a considerable loss in profit to this locality as the crop is usually quite large here each year.

The only hope is for trees located on high ground, or otherwise sheltered, as the thermometer registered from ten to twelve below zero, on an average, in this section last Thursday morning. Two years ago the peach buds were frozen in this community also. It is feared that other varieties of fruit may be likewise affected this year.
