## Farmers Column

VERY VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR THE FARMERS

Bonemeal an Excellent Thing for Swine Pure bred Rams Versus the Scrubs—Skim Milk Good Feed for Hens—Roughage for Cows—Notes

During inclement weather fowls are better indoors than out.

If the hens are not laying the chances are that the fault is with their keeper.

In an egg of 1,000 grains, 600 belongs to the white, 300 to the yolk and 100 to the shell.

Let the children have a pen of bantams. Look at the different breeds at the fairs and buy a pair that attracts you.

The pullet or hen which begins to lay in November will usually lay all winter if properly fed, housed and cared for.

Don't allow your chickens to have scaly legs. Clean and apply a good disinfectant, then rub in plenty of good grease.

That good layers are great eaters. A bird must have capacity to eat and digest a great amount of food if she is to lay a great number of eggs.

Cut out all small chickens and keep the largest and most vigorous ones for winter layers. The long hot summer has retarded the growth of the late ones.

During the eight or ten weeks that cows go dry, their food should be chiefly roughage. A daily allowance of two pounds of bran or oats, or a mixture of two parts each of bran and oats and one part of linseed meal or corn oil meal makes a proper feed for a cow near calving. Some roots, cabbage pumpkins, or squashes are also very good. Highly carbonaceous roughage, such as straw and cornstalks, is not good at this particular time. Such feeds, with cold water, cold drafts, or laying out at night or damp or cold ground are the chief causes of caked udder or garget.

Skim milk is one of the very best feeds for both young chicks and laying hens. The casein, or curdy part of the milk, largely supplies the protein necessary for laying hens, while for fattening fowls there is nothing superior to milk for making juicy, delicate flesh. The milk may be fed either sweet or sour and may be given as a drink or mixed with wheat, bran and oatmeal or both.

Sour skim milk or buttermilk, fed to hens confined in yard or small range, keeps them in health. The acid of the milk supplies the lack of vegetable acid they would pick up on grass pasture, the buttermilk aids digestion. Poultrymen near the wholesale city milkmen and creameries can often buy the sour milk for ten cents per gallon. At this price it is a cheap food.

The University of Missouri publish a circular giving results of a test in which pure bred rams were compared with scrub rams as products of lambs. The average gain of lambs sired by a pure bred ram was over two and a half pounds more at 3 months of age than the gain of lambs sired by a scrub ram at four months of age. And the scrub lambs at 59 per cent. more gain than the lambs from a pure-bred sire. On the market the better bred lambs brought \$7.35 per hundredweight, while the scrubs brought \$4.50 per hundredweight. The use of pure bred sires has been advocated for so long and the economy of using such rams has been so repeatedly demonstrated that it would seem that such tests were no longer necessary. But still many sheep raisers deliberately curtail possible income from their flocks by using cheap rams, anything that can get lambs.

All kinds of bonemeal are used in the manufacture of fertilizers, but not all kinds are suitable for feed for swine. Bonemeal from a glue factory which acid was used is not suitable feed. But any bonemeal, especially green bone that is ground finely enough, may be fed. Steamed bonemeal is good. At the Missouri station bonemeal was fed with good results. About an ounce of meal was fed to each hog per day. At the Nebraska station four lots of pigs were fed to determine the value of wheat short tanlage and steamed ground bone as supplement to corn meal. The hogs were pastured on alfalfa, and for this reason the lot fed on corn alone made about as satisfactory gain as any, although the lot which was fed bone meal in addition to the corn had the strongest bone.

Shorts strengthen the bone some, and tanlage with corn produced much stronger bone than corn alone. Where mixed rations are given, or skim milk or good pasture, all of which supply ash material, it is doubtful that bonemeal is of much value other than for the purpose of strengthening the bones.

## WINTER SOIL TREATMENT—BY KARL LANGENBECK

Special News Letter on Soil Improvement

### Thinking it Over

Every season on the farm has its duties, for in no business does work interlock to the same degree, and what is neglected today, influences profits next year. By this time, the mechanical out door work of the fields is done and Nature is left to her own devices. Freezing, thawing, leaching, action of carbonic acid gas, weathering all the forces of mechanical and chemical action on the soil are most active now. It is well to stop and consider what this means and what the frosts and snows and thaws do for the land. Understanding opens the door for improving. The last crop and the fall rains have taken as much of the plant foods out of the soil as was in condition for solution and absorption by the rootlets. This has to be restored for the coming season's growth.

### Use of the Work Done

The soil contains the necessary elements in abundance, but not in soluble, or as we may truly say, in digestible form. The cracking by frost of the soil particles letting in the water and acid of the air renders them so. Whatever work has been done on the land in breaking it up is so much to good in aiding these natural agencies. This much, every man understands, that work on land, plowing, breaking clods, harrowing, draining, helps fertility by helping Nature's mechanical forces unlock plant food.

### Bettering the Work Done

What the farmer is seldom or never reminded of in simple unmis-takable terms, is, that he can also aid Nature's chemical forces, for without these, plant foods are not made digestible or soluble in the soil in sufficient amount to pay. To remind oneself of what chemical forces are and how they work, smell a bottle of ammonia, put some lye or caustic on the skin or take a taste of sharp vinegar. Then, think how ammonia cleans, lye cuts grease and vinegar will dissolve marble and other hard stones.

### Making Tillage Effective

Now, as physical and forces act together in Nature, particularly in Winter, to make available a new supply of digestible plant food, so must the farmer supplement the work of tillage by the solvent or digestive treatment of chemical agency. European farmers, who well understand this and average 35 bushels of wheat to the acre as against 15 bushels in America, and other crops in proportion, use the one chemical agent for the purpose, which can alone be applied. This agent is lime. Its sharp or caustic property makes it cut the insoluble silicates of potash and phosphates of alumina and iron making potash and phosphates soluble. Burned lime (quicklime) can do no harm in winter to growing things. Where clover and legumes have been plowed under, it furthers their decomposition, correcting the first souring stage and making good humus by Spring. Manure, which is vegetable and animal matter which has gone through this initial decomposition, should be applied some weeks after the lime. In this way, and at any rate at this season, humus destruction by quick lime is a negli-
