FATIGUE

Little Talks on Health & Hygiene by Samuel G. Dixon, M. D. L. L. D.

Everyone has been many times exposed to contagious diseases which they have not contracted. This has been due, not to the fact that contagion was less virulent but because the natural resistance to disease is usually proportioned to the physical well-being of the individual. Avoid fatigue. It is all too often has induced in unusual physical or mental exertion and becomes tired this physical resistance is greatly reduced and the susceptibility to disease increased in proportion.

One of the most common abuses to which we subject ourselves is that of eating when we are fatigued. For domestic convenience it is necessary to have meals at stated hours. In the evening men and women go home exhausted after their day's work. In the majority of instances they have made the trip in an ill ventilated train or trolley which adds to their depression. They arrive just in time to sit down to the table and regardless of their exhausted condition consume a quantity of food.

As a result of fatigue their nervous system is so affected that the digestive processes practically cease and the food so consumed may remain for hours in an undigested condition causing great physical discomfort and sometimes serious complications. Food taken when one is excessively tired is of little value as nourishment. Much better go hungry and avoid indigestion. A few moments absolute repose when one is exhausted will work wonders in this respect. It gives the nervous system a chance to recover its tone and the necessary impulses are then sent out from the nerve centers in the brain to the digestive apparatus.
