WILL SHIP CATTLE WEST

Registered Stock to Be Sent to Seattle

H. C. Reinhold, the East Petersburg dealer in Holstein cattle, will ship, within the next day or two, two additional carloads of registered Holstein cows from East Petersburg to Seattle, Wash. The cattle will go by express and will be only six days on the road. The cattle will be shipped in special cattle express cars which were sent to this county by the Wells Fargo and Company, from St. Paul. The cars are seventy feet long and contain all requisites to feed and water the cattle enroute.

The cattle will be accompanied by two men. Clarence Reinhold, a son of H. C. Reinhold and Walter Harry, a young man of East Petersburg, will go along with them. The young men will spend sometime on the coast.

Lancaster county Holsteins are attracting much attention in the far west on account of their high grade and the comparative low prices. And the express charges from this county per car are a very little more than they are from Chicago to the coast. A number of Lancaster County people will attend the Holstein sale of H. B. Gingrich and Bro., at Lawn, Pa., on Tuesday when George H. Stevenson, president of the Holstein Association of Pennsylvania, and H. C. Reinhold, of the association, will make addresses on the Holstein cow.
