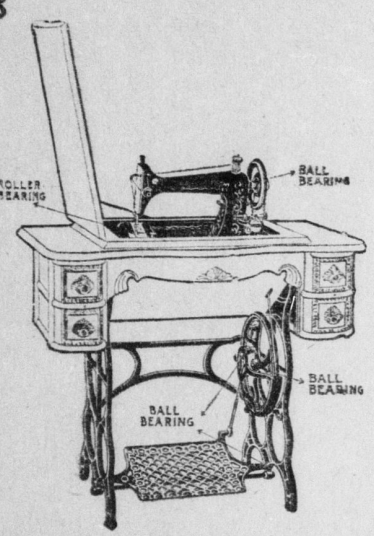

SHERIFF'S POSSE AT BILLMYER

Was Ordered There But Further Action Was Not Necessary

As the result of protracted telephonic communications with the office of District Attorney Groff and Sheriff Milton Eaby starting Thursday morning and concluding late that afternoon a Sheriff's posse of heavily-armed men was organized in the office of the Sheriff Thursday afternoon and sent post-haste to the quarries of the Wrightsville Stone and Lime quarries at Billmyer, where for a time it was feared that a serious race war was pending, if not actually in existence.

It will be recalled that on Sunday evening Vivian Arnett, the fourteen-year-old son of Harvey Arnett, colored, of Bainbridge, shot and killed an Italian whom he had seen enter an out-building at his father's home. The Italian was employed at the Billmyer quarries and had a host of friends among the foreigners quartered in that vicinity. Following the shooting the boy was arrested and brought to the county jail, where he was incarcerated until his release on bail some time following.

The boy returned to his home and has been seen around the premises since by the friends of the dead Italian. Bad blood has been brewing since the shooting, the foreign element taking the view that the shooting was without justification. On the other hand, the negroes of the vicinity naturally sided with the Arnetts. An outbreak on the part of the foreigners was averted until that morning when little groups of excited men were seen congregated at different points in the settlement at Billmyer. Mr. J. S. Baker, head of the quarry company, used every endeavor to quell the impending trouble, but without avail.

A number of the policemen returned home next day but several remained until Sunday, when they departed, everything being quiet again.

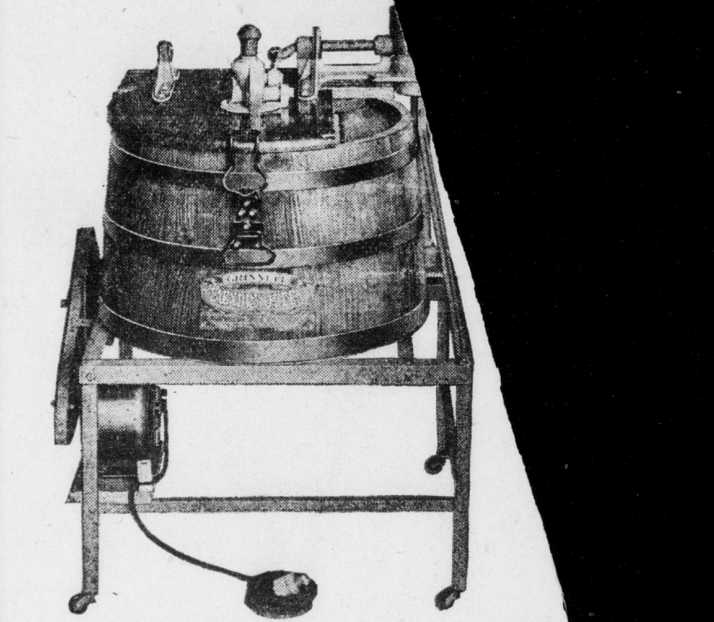
