The Special committee on borough extension reported progress. Burgess Brown said that Solicitor Hensel writes there are two ways by which to extend the borough lines.

The Board of Health reported no reportable diseases during March and general health of the borough very good.

Bids from Jacob H. Shenk and Clarence Schock for oiling the streets were opened and read. Mr. Schock was awarded the contract, he being the lowest bidder.

The report of the Union National Bank treasurer showed a balance of \$2,021.79 in the Borough account and \$3,983.01 in the Water account.

The Clerk was ordered to get out the tax duplicate for 1914 until May 1st.

The stone bids as procured by the Street committee, were then read as follows:

J. N. Stauffer & Bro. quoted per 2,000 as follows: Fine, \$1.10; No. 2, 95c; No. 3, 85c; Coarse or broken, no bid.

Mr. D. F. Gable recommended relaying the crossings on North Barbara street at Frank street and North Alley. So ordered.

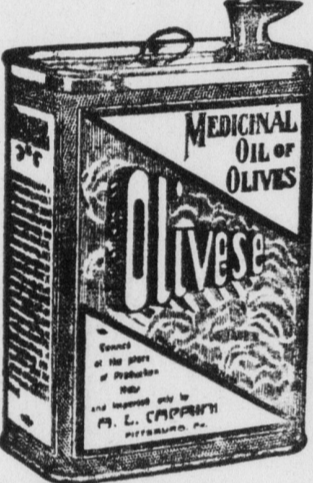
Ministerial Association
