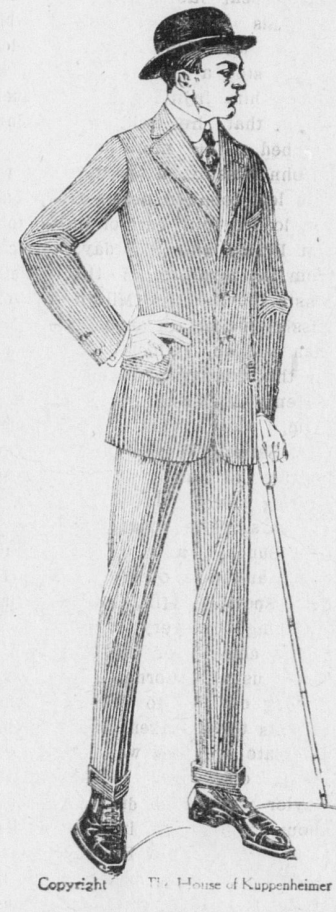

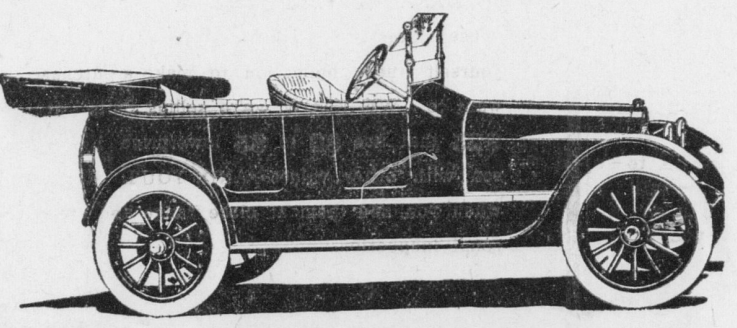

SHAD ARE SCARCE

None of Them Have Been Seen Above Perryville as Yet

McCall's Ferry--Not a shad has been taken in the Susquehanna River above Perryville this year so far and

very few at Perryville and Havre-de-Grace. This is most unusual and it now looks as if few shad will be taken below the dam before May 1. Reports from the Lower Chesapeake Bay are to the effect that there are lots of shad there, but on up the bay, practically none have been

caught. In fact from Havre-de-Grace down by the bay to Poplar's Island less shad have been caught this year than ever known. Still the fishermen have hopes that the "runs" that are now in the lower bay may make fishing good in the closing weeks of the season.

A special from Baltimore says: Notwithstanding the stormy weather of the last few weeks, shad from the Lower Chesapeake Bay are arriving in quantity and the market is firm at 50 cents for roe and 25 cents for buck wholesale.
