### Borough Council

#### Proposed Borough Extension Looks Like a Sure Thing

MR. E. H. ZERCHER GETS 28 OUT OF 35 SIGNATURES

There Will be a Resurvey of the Proposed Borough Lines So as to Avoid the Henry Eberle Cemetery—Council Will Parade Decoration Day—Oiling Streets Will Begin May 18

Mount Joy Borough Council met in regular session Monday evening with the following members present: Messrs. Dillinger, Barto, Gable and Sumpman. Also Burgess Brown and Clerk Fellenbaum.

An invitation was received from the Memorial Day Committee requesting Council and the Burgess to participate in the parade on that day. The invitation was accepted and the Burgess was instructed to provide means for the body.

Burgess Brown reported having purchased three \$100 Water Bonds and collections amounting to \$454 were turned over to the treasurer.

Mr. Barto of the Street Committee, reported having covered Market street from Main to the railroad with a coat of stone; hauled nearly all the rubbish and ashes; repaired a number of alleys, and that as a demonstration, two methods of oiling the streets would be experimented with. One side of Main street from Bowman's store to the Church of God will be swept and thin road oil applied. On the other side a heavier grade of road oil will be tried without sweeping the street. After that which ever is deemed best will be applied. Oiling the streets will begin on May 18 by Mr. Clarence Schock, who was given the contract recently.

Mr. Sumpman of the Property Committee, reported the new tool house completed; repairs made as ordered at water works and that the fence on the east side of the park will be made soon.

There was no report from the Board of Health but President Dillinger stated that he knew of a case of typhoid fever in the borough.

The report of the Union National Bank, treasurer, showed a balance of \$1,533.56 in the Borough account and \$2,734.87 in the Water account with a balance of \$590 in the interest account.

Mr. E. H. Zercher presented a petition that he had drawn up and circulated, petitioning those who would be effected by the proposed extension of the borough lines. There would be thirty-five families interested and of these Mr. Zercher procured the signatures of twenty-eight who favored the extension. The petition was read and the Solicitor will now be asked to draw a final petition which will again be circulated.

As we have an existing borough ordinance prohibiting cemeteries in the borough, the Burgess, Borough Council and a surveyor will make a re-survey of the proposed lines, thereby eliminating the Henry Eberle Cemetery which was heretofore included in the proposed extension.

A number of years ago a four-inch main was laid from the water main to the Kurtz tannery on East Main street. Council decided to remove the 4-inch pipe and replace it with an inch pipe which will supply the property now owned by Mrs. Jennie Bowers.

### BOARD ELECTED TEACHERS

Applicants "Too Numerous To Mention" for Two of the Vacancies

The Mount Joy Borough School Board met in regular session Monday evening with all members present. The school term was fixed as follows: Nine months for the High School and eight and a-half months for the grades. The tax rate was made six mills for school purposes and one mill for building purposes, a net total of seven mills, which is same as last year.

The teachers' salaries were made: First Assistant, \$70 per month; Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh Grades, \$55 per month. All these salaries are same as were paid heretofore.

These teachers were then unanimously elected: Principal—Vacant. Music and Art—Vacant. First Assistant—Miss Marguerite Herr.

Second Assistant—Vacant. Grammar—Miss Edna Martin. Intermediate—Miss Elizabeth Eschleman.

Secondary—Vacant. Fourth Primary—Miss Katharine Aumiller. Third Primary—Miss Verna Chandler.

Second Primary—Miss Ruth Stoll. First Primary—Mrs. Mary Garber Miller.

Prof. C. E. Roudabush, who has been principal here the past two years, had not applied but we understand he will be re-elected. His work here has been very satisfactory to the directors, teachers, pupils and patrons, and there are very many requests for his return.

For the two school vacancies there were applicants "too numerous to mention," so many in fact that the Board was unable to decide at this meeting. Misses Mabel Donovan and Miss Eva Kreider, were no applicants for re-election, having been elected by the directors.

Janitor Jno. H. Wharwell was re-elected at the same salary, i. e., \$40 per month for nine months and \$25 per month for the remaining three months.

Bids were received from Messrs. F. H. Baker and Clarence Schock on a load of coal. The latter was the lowest and was given the order.

The Board voted unanimous on raising the salary of County Superintendent Fleischer \$1,000 per annum. Numerous other minor matters were discussed, bills paid and the Board adjourned after quite a lengthy session.

Three automobilists whose names could not be learned but who are said to be from Landisville, met with a narrow escape Sunday afternoon about 4 o'clock at the toll gate on the Lancaster and Columbia turnpike, just east of Columbia. The right front wheel was torn off, the axle bent, and the machine badly damaged. Fortunately the occupants were not thrown out and escaped injury.

William M. Grissinger died Monday at the General Hospital, about midnight of typhoid fever. Mr. Grissinger's home is in Manheim, and he had been a patient at the hospital for about a week. He is survived by a wife and four children.

Dorothy W. Shaffner, the eighteen-months-old daughter of Jacob Shaffner, died at her home at Maytown on Friday night. Death was due to erysipelas. The funeral took place Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, with interment in the Lutheran Cemetery.
