He stated that next year no doubt the trusts will pay large prices for tobacco, since it is time again for them to stock up, their purpose being to blot out the new company to control prices entirely. Then, if the farmers fall into the trap, the following year they will pay low prices and have a grip on the farmer's neck.

UNCLE SAM TAKE NOTICE

Lancaster County Can Furnish 23,437 Fighting Men

Lancaster County has enrolled for military purposes 23,437 men. That is larger than General Meade commanded at Gettysburg, and would put to shame most of the armies of the battle famous in history. The enrollment for 1914 has been completed by the County Commissioners, and is now ready for Uncle Sam if that old gentleman should need to call.

The law provides that a military enrollment must be made each year of all the men in a county available for military purposes. That includes all the able-bodied men between the ages of 18 and 40.

Lancaster city, of course, is the banner district. It has 7,714 ready for war duty—almost twice as many as it required to take Vera Cruz. Columbia has 1,617 ready for the call and the others are well divided. The booby prize goes to Washingtonboro, with 69. The military enrollment to the nearby district in the county follows:

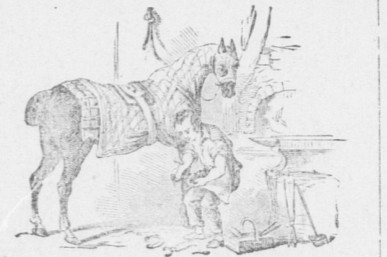

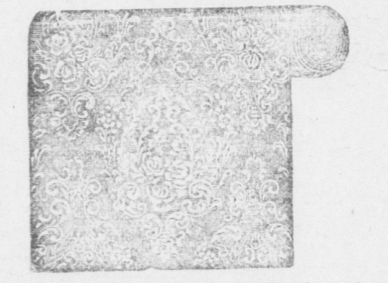
