**Rev. George W. Dungan**  
A short illness terminated Thursday in the death in the Methodist Hospital, Philadelphia, of Rev. Geo. W. Dungan, pastor of the Narberth M. E. Church. He was aged 60 years. During his 32 years of ministry he held pastorates in Philadelphia, Tannersville, Richmond, Tremont, Leighton, Pine Grove, Mt. Joy, Shenandoah, Norristown, Prospect Park and Stroudsburg. His body was taken to Stroudsburg for burial after services in the Thirteenth street church, Philadelphia, on Monday. Rev. Dungan was pastor of the Methodist Church here several years, preceding the present pastor, Rev. Johnston, who is now serving his second year.

**Dr. Samuel S. Gray**  
Dr. Samuel S. Gray, a very prominent citizen of Landisville, and one of the oldest practicing physicians in the county, died at his home at 8 o'clock on Saturday, in his 76th year.

The deceased was a son of the late Justus and Barbara Gray and was born at Landisville. He studied medicine with the late Dr. A. K. Rohrer of Mountville, and graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in 1863. He was appointed as assistant surgeon of different regiments of the Civil War and was stationed at Camp Curtin, in Harrisburg, for some time. He was assistant surgeon of cavalry in the department of Monongahela in the twenty-ninth volunteers and the Twentieth regiment of Pennsylvania cavalry. He also served with Sheridan thru the Shenandoah Valley. In 1875 he was appointed surgeon of the steamship "Pennsylvania" sailing between Philadelphia and Liverpool, England. After filling the position for three years he located permanently at Landisville, where he practiced medicine until his health failed. He was a member of the State and County Medical Societies and at one time was vice-president of the former. He formerly was a member of General Welsh post of the G. A. R. of Columbia. He leaves a wife and these children: Henry W., Walter and Justus. His only living sister is Mrs. Elizabeth Parry, widow of Dr. H. B. Parry of Lancaster.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Bethel Church, Landisville. Interment was made in the Landisville Cemetery.

**Masonic Home News**

The magnitude of this great undertaking of the Freemasons of Pennsylvania is gradually becoming more apparent to the observer as its development goes on apace. Stupendous as it appeared in its conception, yet to an institution existing for ages, and keeping step with the progress of time; composed of the leaders of men in all climes and maintaining its pre-eminence to the present, it would seem that no undertaking within the accomplishment of man would be among the impossible. So this vast design for the future was conceived in minds, that saw its coming necessity. Its extensive demands, its sure accomplishment and the crown of glory and distinction which awaits its accomplishment. A vast tract of land, punctuated with important buildings; with its administrative, social and domestic centre wonderfully established; its modern buildings and devices for the community's working life in use and operation; its one thousand acres in cultivation and bloom; its sheep-fold, model chicken farm, model dairy and pigery being developed; and now one of its large guest houses being re-erected for a Children's Home arouses this realization.

Guest House No. 1 is a commodious structure on an elevated site, at the junction of the Falmouth turnpike and our Ridge road. It adjoins Mt. Moriah grove, which is a beautiful piece of woodland, ornamented by Mount Moriah Lodge, No. 300, of Huntingdon, on which they erected a large rustic rest house or covered pavilion. Swings, hammocks and benches line the walks of the grove. This has been set aside for, and will make an ideal Children's Home. Already fifteen children have been admitted to the Homes, so that soon the merry voices of children will mingle with the sweet songs of the myriad of birds and there will be harmony in the grove.

No less than twenty-five new guests arrived at the Homes during the month of April, while four died, giving us a total of 155 at present.

The opening of the Guest houses is far inadequate to the housing of the ever increasing multitude, and the new buildings of the village are an immediate necessity. Arrangements are rapidly being completed for the erection of one to accommodate sixty guests and have it completed for occupancy in the fall.

All this makes busy times for the Committee on Masonic Homes, and their arduous duties and grave responsibilities entitles them to the sympathy of the Fraternity as their M. C. E. Meeting, 7:30 P. M. Evening service, Subject David and commendation. The evening of the 29th and the morning of the 30th of April, found them gathered at the Homes, engaged in solving their complex problems.

Miss Martha Davis of Lancaster has kindly donated to the Homes, a remarkably fine mounted Elk's head, with unusually large developed antlers, also a large arm chair, made of the horns of wild animals. This present is a memorial to the late Dr. Samuel T. Davis of Lancaster, who was Past Master of Lambertton Lodge, No. 476, and was a well known hunter, who lost his life in the wilds of Mexico a few years since, while on a hunting expedition. The specimens were the doctor's valued trophies of the hunt, were prepared by him and most highly valued. They find a fitting setting at the great fire place of the dining hall.

On Sunday, April 28th, the services were ably and appreciatively conducted by Rev. J. H. DeLons, professor of Hebrew and Old Testament Science in the German Reformed Seminary at Lancaster, while in a similar manner, the Rev. Emil Meisler, pastor of St. Stephens Lutheran Church of Lancaster, officiated on Sunday, May 3rd. During the latter service, Miss Adams of Lancaster, sang a beautiful solo.

Thanks to our friends far and near, our social entertainments are not neglected, in fact, the present finds a number for our acceptance and enjoyment.

On Wednesday evening, April 29th, the young people of Elizabethtown, gave us a very enjoyable rendition of "Ye Village Skewl of Long Ago," which they had rendered in the town on the 28th, for the benefit of their Fire Company.
