Struck By a Train

Martin S. Seachrist of Near Town, The Victim
DR. MUNYON; THERE'S HOPE
Board of Trade Now in Direct Communication With Shoe Co.
Was Instantly Killed While Driving Over P. R. R. at Brandt's Crossing, Half a Mile West of Florin at Noon on Saturday
Struck by a mail train going, it is said, a mile a minute, Martin Seachrist of near this borough, was hurled to a fearful death at noon Saturday, his body thrown high into the air and fifty feet from the crossing, and his horse carried on the cow-catcher of the train a mile from the scene of the accident.
Mr. Seachrist was one of the best known farmers in this section, residing about a mile southwest of here. Saturday morning, shortly before noon he hitched up his team and started away from his home. About a half mile west of Florin, his destination being Welley's blacksmith shop, took him across the Pennsylvania railroad tracks. At this point there is a curve in the railroad, but persons driving over the crossing from the south, have a clear and unobstructed view of the railroad, both east and west, for at least a mile. It was while crossing the tracks at this point, at 11:55, that Train No. 13 came along at a terrific speed, being a solid mail train, and they will soon make their tracks known.
Train Going at High Speed
The engineer was evidently making close to sixty miles an hour, for the train was stopped only after it had proceeded nearly a mile. The train could have been stopped much sooner, but the engineer was not aware that he had struck anything until after woe seller Zeller.
