Landis and wife, Mr. and Mrs. Martin Rutt, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Erb and Mr. and Mrs. Tillman Kraybill. To Keep Plums on The Trees. The Superintendent of a charitable home in the eastern part of Pennsylvania wrote to the State Zoologist, H. A. Surface, Harrisburg, stating that a large plum tree blooms profusely each year, yet only a few plums mature. He asks what to do to preserve the fruit for the institution. In reply to the inquiry Prof. Surface wrote as follows: If possible, spray before the blossoms burst, using lime-sulphur solution the same as for San Jose scale. You can get this from dealers in your town and dilute it according to their directions, or make it yourself by boiling two pounds of sulphur and one pound of lime in each gallon of water for a half hour. After the blossoms fall spray again, using a pint of concentrated lime-sulphur solution in 20 gallons of water, or this proportion, adding to one-half ounce of arsenate of lead to each gallon of liquid used. Just after the little brown hush or

spray again, using the same material, in two weeks give it another application of the extra dilute lime-sulphur solution and arsenate of lead. About the time the fruit is two-thirds grown spray with self-boiled lime-sulphur solution made as follows: With each pound of sulphur slake a pound of quick lime, stirring the ingredients together with enough water to slake the lime well. Then add water enough to make 6 gallons, and add one-half ounce of arsenate of lead to each gallon of liquid. This is the last spraying needed. I have known of successful results in the use of dilute Bordeaux mixture instead of lime-sulphur solution. This consists of 2 pounds of bluestone and 3 pounds of quicklime in 50 gallons of water, with 2 pounds of arsenate of lead added. Of course, to make a small quantity use the same proportions. Give the sprayings at the same time as for the lime-sulphur solution preparations.
