At this time of year, numerous requests are received for concise control measures for various insect troubles affecting fruit and vegetable crops. Lack of space will not permit entering into details. For this reason, general rather than particular control will be stated.

Two general classes of combative materials are used according as the insect chews or sucks its food: First internal poisons which kills the insect when eaten with its food (leaves, flowers, etc.) And second, external poisons which kill insects by either closing the breathing pores or by their caustic action on the insect itself.

Paris Green is a combination of arsenic and copper. Ordinarily made Paris Green contains a small amount of soluble arsenic which will burn the leaves. To reduce the burning property an amount of freshly slacked lime should be added equal to the Paris Green. For apple, pear, potatoes, etc., it may be added at the rate of 68 ounces per 50 gallons of water or fungicide. It is not very advisable to use this material on stone fruit trees, as the peach.

London Purple contains more soluble arsenic than Paris Green and should be used in less amount. It is generally not advisable to use this poison except with Bordeaux mixture. Arsenate of Lead is fast supplanting other arsenic poisons because it is less injurious to foliage. This poison is supplied to the market in both the powder and the paste form, general two to four pounds of paste or one to two pounds of powder to fifty gallons of water or fungicide will be found both safe and effective.

Arsenite of Lime is one of the cheapest home-made insecticides and may be made by mixing two pounds of White Arsenic, two pounds Sol soda and one and one half gallons of water. Boil until dissolved and add four pounds of tone lime. Add water to make two gallons. For use add one quart of this solution to fifty gallons of water.

Helibore is a vegetable poison less dangerous to man than the above poisons. For this reason it is often used on fruits before ripening. It should be used at the rate of one ounce to a gallon of water. There are numerous commercial preparations on the market such as Pyrox which serve both as an insecticide and a fungicide.

Tobacco Deactions are very useful in controlling plant lice and similar delicate insects. A home mixture may be made by thoroughly boiling one pound of tobacco in two gallons of water. This should be filtered through a cloth and made up to the original two gallons. A number of tobacco extracts such as "Black Leaf 40" are now on the market.

Pyrethrum kills insects through the breathing pores and is not poisonous to man. It may be applied at full strength with a bellows or as a spray at the rate of one ounce to two gallons of water.

Kerosene Emulsion is a remedy for scale insects and may be made by mixing two gallons of kerosene, one half pound of hard soap and one gallon of water. Boil the soap and add the kerosene immediately after removing from the fire. This mixture should then be pumped through a force pump for about fifteen minutes directing the stream back into the containing vessel. For a summer spray use one part of this solution and ten parts of water. A number of brands of oil sprays have been placed on the market but they are losing favor because they are generally more expensive than the lime sulphur sprays.

Concentrated Lime Sulphur is the standard remedy for scale insects. Good commercial brands are on the market or it may be easily and cheaply made at home according to the formula: 25 pounds pure lime (not hydrated), 50 pounds of flower sulphur and 25 gallons of water.

The lime should be placed in a vessel and slacked. Add the sulphur free of lumps by gradually stirring into a thin paste. Add water to make about 50 gallons. Boil until sulphur scum disappears, then add water to about 60 gallons and boil vigorously so that at the end of one hour about 55 gallons will remain. In this boiling process it is well to have a measuring stick which will indicate the 10, 20, 30, 40, 50 and 60 gallon height of the mixture. When finished the material should be strained into closed barrels or if open a layer of oil should be poured over the top. The density of the mixture will be determined by a hydrometer and will read about 1.24. Commercial preparations will read about 1.28. Divide the decimal of the solution by the decimal of the required spray for the number of dilutions. Thus at this time of year a 1.008 strength is satisfactory for apple scab and codling moth. With a 1.24 solution, .24 divided by .008 would require 30 dilutions.

The Codling Moth does probably more damage to the apple than any other insect. The "worm" of this insect is hatched out upon the new leaves and immediately searches for
