### ROADS WILL BE OILED

#### The Stretch from Columbia to Williamstown to be Covered

One of the most extensive applications of oil to highways which has ever been undertaken in the Eastern United States is at present under way in Lancaster county and involves the expenditure of thousands of dollars. When the project is completed it will mean the entire elimination of the dust nuisance for a continuous stretch of twenty-two miles, from Columbia to Lancaster and from Lancaster to Williamstown. It will necessitate the application of from 50,000 to 60,000 gallons of oil. This work will require five or six days of continuous labor for a large force of men and will be begun and completed next week, according to the present plans.

The first consignment of the dust killer for the ten mile stretch on the Lancaster and Columbia pike arrived Thursday and the lubricant to allay the dust on the twelve miles of road of the Lancaster and Williamstown turnpike will arrive shortly, in plenty of time for the drenching of that highway next week.

The magnitude of these two tasks are equalled in their special lines by no known undertakings east of California.

Asphalted road oil, consisting of a mixture of asphaltine and road oil, manufactured by the Atlantic Refining company, will be used and is considered the best of its kind. When applied the oil soaks into the ground while the asphaltine remains on the surface, forming an excellent coating. From 1,500 to 2,000 gallons of this oil are usually applied to a mile of road, at a cost of about seven cents per gallon.

**For Ants on Plants and Lawns**  
Among the inquiries reaching the office of the State Zoologist at Harrisburg one that is very frequently sent each spring calls for information as to how to treat ants on plants or lawns, in order to get rid of their objectionable presence or overcome some supposed injury to plants.

In reply to such inquiries Professor Surface calls attention to the fact that as a rule ants do not directly attack vegetation, and their presence on plants indicates either glands that are secreting sweet juices which the ants drink, or the presence of plant lice or scale insects, which also furnish a liquid commonly called honey dew. The presence of ants on plants should not be alarming, excepting for the important fact that they indicate the presence of more serious enemies, such as plant lice or aphids. The latter can be destroyed by spraying with a decoction of tobacco, or by dilute kerosene emulsion or strong soap solution.

Where ants are objectionable because making holes in the ground around plants, they can be killed by putting a little gasoline or benzine into the holes, or by dusting the soil abundantly with tobacco decoction into the holes a tobacco decoction. On lawns it is not difficult to destroy ants by making holes into their nests with sharp pointed sticks and pouring in an inflammable liquid called carbon bisulfide, which should at all times be kept away from fire. Success has been obtained by exterminating them by the use of gasoline poured into holes made in the nests with sticks. The holes should be filled with clay after the liquid is poured in.

Where ants enter houses they are, of course, decidedly objectionable, because such intruders are never desired. The best thing to do is to feed them well with sugar or some other material that will help them establish a path of migration to their nests, and then follow them as they travel in a line or path, and locate the nest. It is then an easy matter to pour in kerosene or carbon bisulfide or gasoline and destroy the queen. After the queen is destroyed there will be no more trouble from this colony of ants. If the queen is not destroyed it is impossible to procure permanent relief from them by any material that can be used but temporarily to repel them.

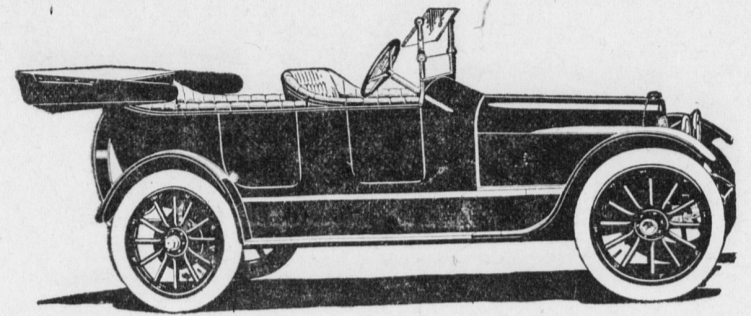
