

17-YEAR LOCUST DUE AGAIN

Expected to Make its Appearance in Three Counties of State

Washington, D. C.,-Brood 5 of the eriodical cicade, commonly known as the seventeen-year locust, is expected to make its reappearance in Ohio, West Virginia and Pennsylvania early in June. This is the teritory which brood 5 of these insects risited in the summer of 1898. The sect when it appears, causes conderable damage to newly-planted rchards and shade trees in this tertory. The scientists of the Bureau Entomology of the Department of Agriculture are, therefore, watching his territory, where the insect is ue to reappear, with a view to minnizing its damage.

The locust is due to appear in Faytte, Greene and Washington unties in Pennsylvania
