ester, Mount Joy, Harrisburg and return. This run will be made in the very near future and Mr. Brandt is creating interest among local motorists and will give the contestants a rousing welcome when they pass thru here. To give motorists an idea we would state that the Cadillac owned and driven by Mr. Stewart, has quite a record. It was one of the cars that went over last week's run with a perfect score and this is remarkable

when one considers the following: Last summer Mr. Stewart toured Europe in this car. Among other difficult roads he passed over was one worthy of mention, the Coldu For-Clauz, a connecting pass between the St. Bernard and the tete Noire, in the Bernese Oberland Alps of Switzerland. Altitude of actual climb was 5,100 feet in seven miles. Only 18 cars ever crossed in safety. This was the first American car to go westward over this pass. Never had more than three feet of room at any one time, sometimes as close as 6 to 8 inches. No railing or walls at any point. Time re-

Traffic westward only between 5 and 10 A. M., eastward only 12 to 6 P. M. Absolutely no room to pass at any one point except the extreme top. Altogether crossed five Alpine Passes, including the Simplon, Brung, Col du Mosses and others. Also negotiated three Appenine Passes in Italy. The highest altitude was reached on the Simplon Pass in Switzerland, being over 11,000 feet. Encountered snow on 6th of July. Total distance of trip was 4,113.5 miles. It may be of interest to local auto men to see this car. Mr. Stewart is one of the most experienced chauffeurs in the state. He is the son of the pioneer grain man of Shippenburg.
