Ricksecker's recommendation. Dr. Richards of the Finance Committee, reported the approval of a number of bills which were afterward paid.

Mr. Sumpman of the Property committee, reported cellar in the post office building was concreted. The committee was ordered to rebuild the fence along the east side of the park. Mr. Ricksecker of the Light Committee, reported all the lights satisfactory and the pole in question recently, having received the proper attention by the Edison Company.

Civil Engineer M. N. Brubaker presented a drawing of the present borough boundary extension. The matter was discussed at length and Mr. Brubaker was instructed to make some alterations and present it at the next meeting.

Ex-Burgess Hoffman, president of the Board of Health, reported one death from typhoid fever and that there are no reportable cases of disease in the borough.

The report of the Union National Mt. Joy Bank, treasurer, showed a balance of \$1,758.05 in the Borough account and \$2,640.28 in the Water account with \$576 in the interest account.

Upon motion of Mr. Barto, the Property Committee was ordered to remove the old hose drier and the Fire Company will be asked to suggest something to take its place.

The bill of the Independent Oil Company for applying 15,464 gallons of oil was paid, amounting to \$1,043.83. A number of other bills were then paid and Council adjourned.

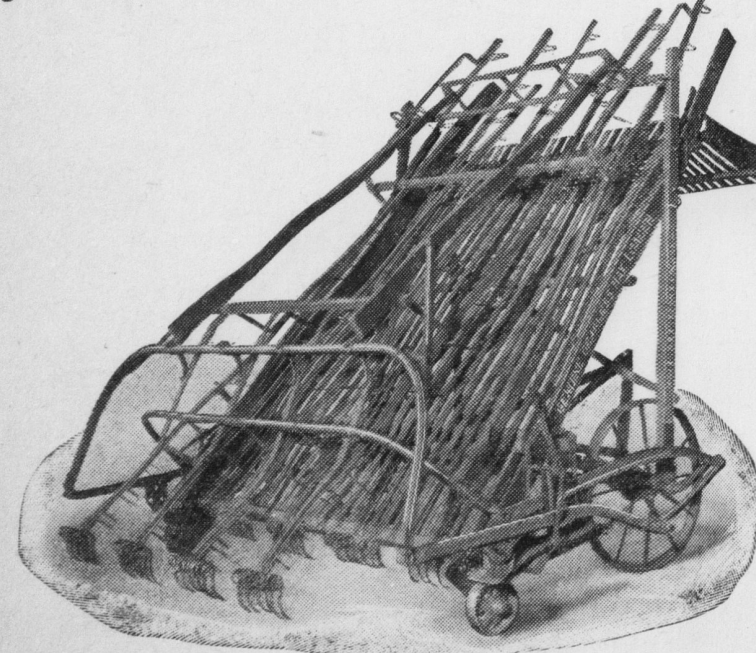
