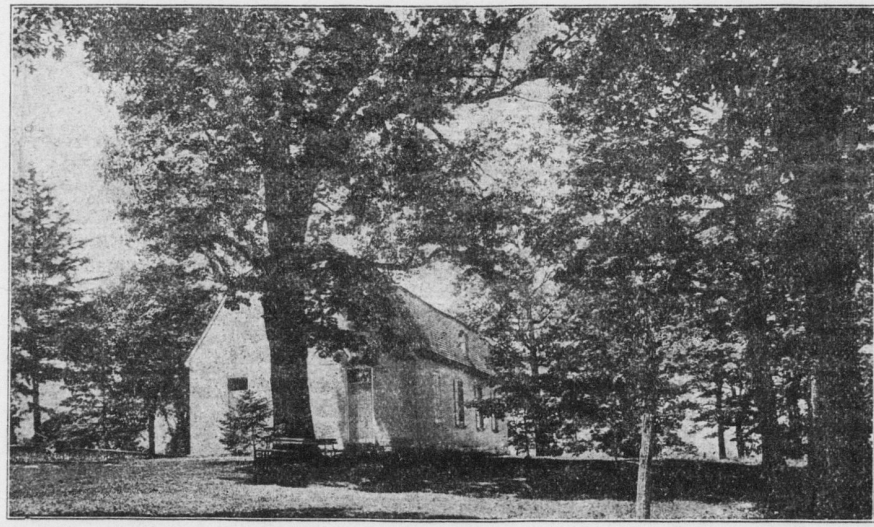

The sharp and pointed iron pickets pierced the fleshy part of the horse's hind legs, inflicting very deep and painful wounds.

THE BOROUGHS LINES

Special Meeting Monday Night to Discuss the Matter

Mount Joy Borough Council held a special meeting Monday evening for the purpose of settling the boundary lines of the proposed borough extension. They met at the office of Mr. M. N. Brubaker, on East Main street.

It was decided to leave the Henry Eberle cemetery out of the borough but the new extension lines will almost encircle it. Land on both sides of the Marietta pike for quite a distance beyond the toll gate will be taken in.

The line will not extend as far west as was previously mentioned, and will not include all of the Helman farm. Also instead of following a straight line across the P. R. R. tracks to the pike at a point near the toll gate, the line will only go as far as the railroad tracks. The tracks will then be the line as far east as the present borough line, thence across to the Reuben Stauffer farm, across the farm tenanted by Monroe Sheaffer to the extreme north end of Market street, thence across land of W. B. Detwiler on the south side of the Manheim road, leaving out Mr. Detwiler's brick house near the bridge but including the row of houses owned by C. G. Sherk.

The other lines will remain as was noted in these columns recently. Mr. Brubaker was ordered to make a blue print of these new lines and present them as soon as ready.

A special committee was appointed to go to Harrisburg today to attend a meeting of protest against the public service law recently enacted. Messrs. B. S. Dillinger, Dr. F. L. Richards and D. F. Gable were appointed and they went this morning, making the trip by automobile.
