Hay making is going on between showers, with a rush. The stand of grass was very heavy.

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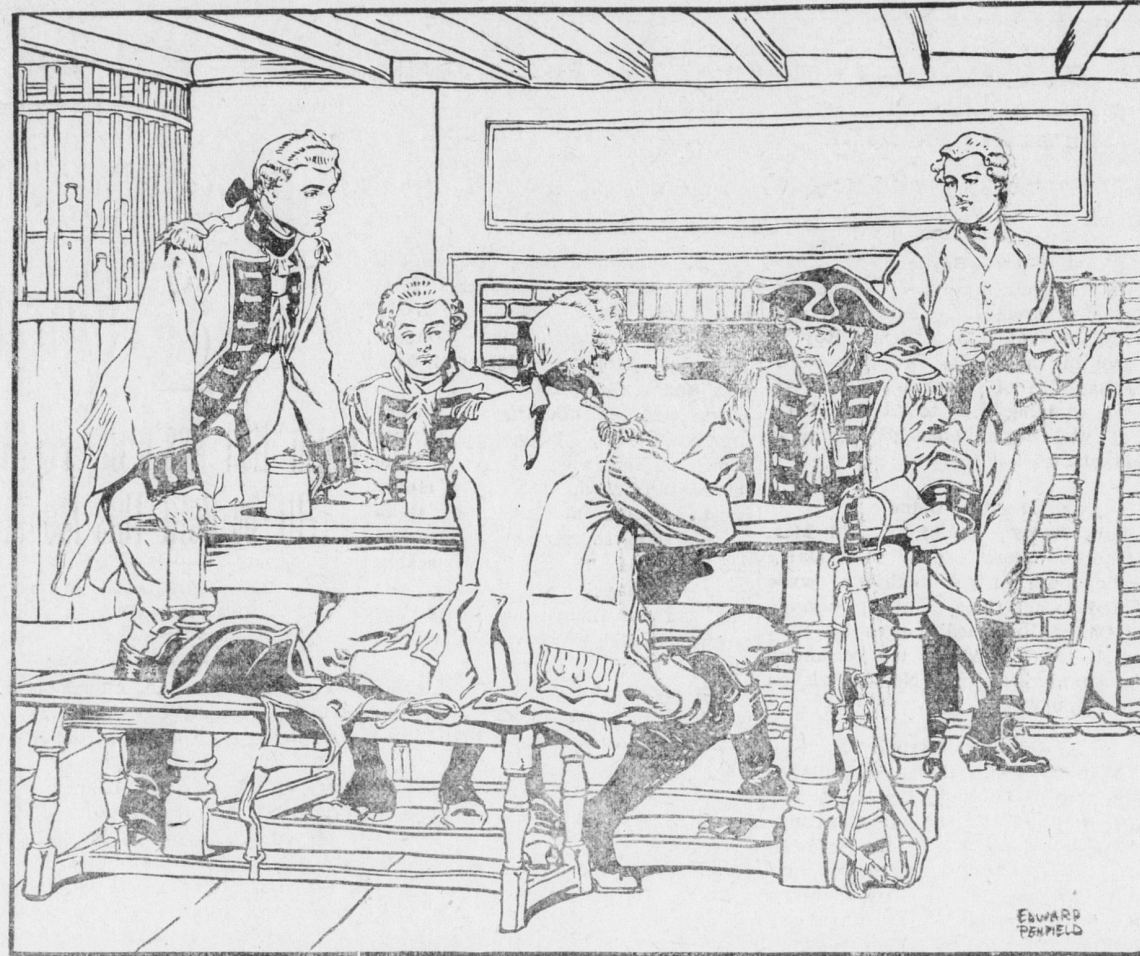
