Farmers Column

VERY VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR THE FARMERS

F. S. Bucher, of the Lancaster County Farm Bureau, Gives Some Interesting Notes in Regard to Things That Will Interest All Farmers

During the cool weather experienced on several days during the week, the attacks of the plant louse or green aphid on truck and fruit crops have become rather serious. Among the truck crops peas, melons and cabbage have suffered the most. Young apple trees which are affected are also apparently stunted in their wood and leaf development.

This louse passes through its life cycle in a very short time, so that when they are uncontrolled thousands of these tiny insects may develop in the course of a few days. To detect the presence of lice one must always search on the under side of the leaf or on unexposed places along the stem or branch where they may invariably be found when present.

Fortunately nature has provided a natural enemy which aids in holding the aphids in check. These enemies, however, are least active in their good work during cool weather. For this reason, spraying often becomes advisable. Commercial whale oil soap or a spray made by boiling one pound of tobacco refuse in one gallon of water may be used with good effect in controlling the pests. When spraying the nozzle should be directed up rather than down.

Several inquiries have been received relative to the control of root maggots on cabbage and root crops. This particular maggot as well as several related species feed upon the tender root of corn, peas, cabbage and generally all of the cruciferous plants. The "worm" bores into the interior of the root and often up into the stem causing the plant to die or to remain stunted in growth.

One of the best control mixtures may be made by boiling one pound of soap (whale oil or home-made) two quarts of carbolic acid and two gallons of water. When thoroughly dissolved and mixed the concentrate should be diluted to 50 gallons. Enough should be applied to reach the affected part of stem or root.

Nearly the entire 1914 tobacco crop has now been planted. It now becomes a matter of first importance to get the crop started as soon as possible and to keep it growing in order to raise the actual or the reputed quality of our Lancaster tobacco. To do this nothing is so essential as the proper and complete conservation of moisture. This is the same story told hundreds of times yet it nevertheless has apparently fallen upon some unhearing ears even in Lancaster county.

Shortly after the crop is transplanted the soil mulch should be formed. The deeper the cultivation the more effectively the moisture supply will be controlled. As the plants become larger the cultivation should be shallower but no less frequent. This will prevent the pruning of lateral roots but will nevertheless keep the soil in an ample supply of moisture and soil nutrients available even though the "rain man" may not be as lavish as we may desire.

Haymaking and harvest are coming on apace. Are the wagons, the reaper, the mower, the hay hook all in good working order? A very profitable day might be spent in getting the harvesting implements in good working order now rather than to put off until the day when the extra day labor is employed. Good management requires the efficient employment of labor as well as the use of efficient labor.

Chicago Grain Letter

There will be no accumulation of wheat in this market during next month, and for this reason there will be little of this grain for delivery on July contracts. It is said there is still a good sized open interest in that month, which means that the shorts either will be obliged to go into the pit and even up their positions or purchase wheat in the country, and bring it in and deliver it. Conditions in the July future are abnormal. The largest wheat crop we have ever raised in this country is at our very doors, but it is said that the longs in July will demand delivery of the grain bought as they purchased it for the purpose of shipping it to the Old World. There is no open interest in the August future, but the outward movement of wheat during that month will take care of everything that is sent here, as well as in the smaller markets.

The price break in wheat at Chicago has been severe, and it is the largest in many years, but before the present low prices were reached, exporters were kind enough to take on millions of bushels, and they will ship it to foreign countries as rapidly as it is to be had. Those in the trade who look upon the situation as quite bearish and feel that lower prices must rule later on, are advising their friends and acquaintances to be cautious in putting out short lines at the present prices. A bullish set of stocks will be spread before the wheat trade Monday.

A thorough wetting down of the corn belt would mean sharply lower prices for that grain, but a continuation of dry weather would mean a continued advance in corn. This market may be put down as a scaling affair, with the larger traders on the board adhering to the 'bull' side. The old bear crowd in this grain attacked prices during last week, but they were forced to run to cover and were made to pay losses. There is little or no trade in cash corn as a result of increased offerings from Argentine, and the import takings at the Seaboard last week were small and are likely to continue insignificant.

The farm supplies of corn are quite small, and holders are not likely to dispose of their surplus. It is believed by many of the grain men that corn is likely to sell above wheat in case the latter is pressed on the various markets of the country.

Oats are likely to follow corn in its changes, yet there will be seen less bullish enthusiasm in oats than in corn. Crop reports are somewhat better with the possible exception of Southern Illinois and the Southwest, where rain is needed.

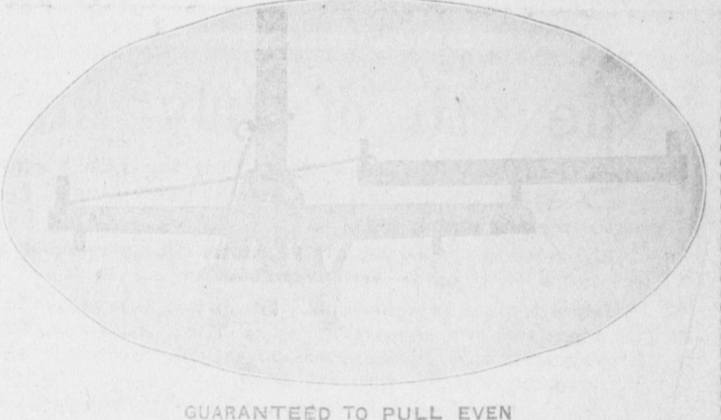
