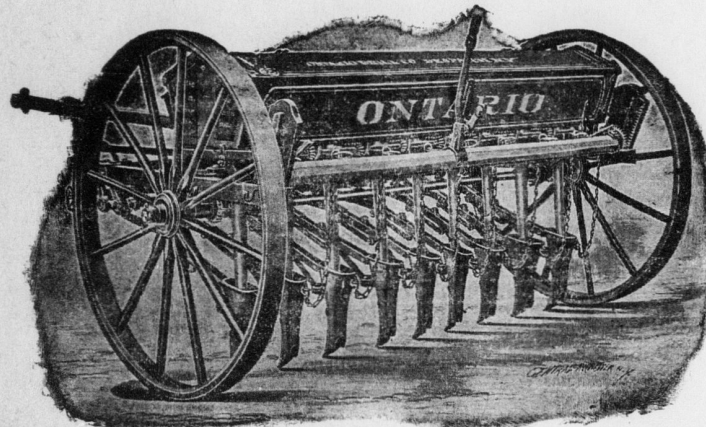

THE STATE'S SIDE OF IT

Reasons Why Accidents Should Be Reported

Many inquiries have been received by the Department of Labor and Industry as to why accidents to employees should be reported to the State.

There are two very good and proper replies to these questions. In the first place, the reporting of accidents to a central State department, which is responsible for their investigation, gives a basis upon which to reduce their recurrence. Thus, for instance, if it is found that a very large number of accidents occur on a certain part of a turning lathe, the department at once is given a danger signal that the time is at hand for studying that particular machine and notifying users of it how they can avoid this class of injuries in the future. During the first six months of the present year there have been reported to the Department approximately twenty-five thousand accidents in the industries of this Commonwealth. Such a bulk of reports of serious or fatal injuries evidently forms a text book of the utmost value, both to the Department and to the people of the State, for the study of this great problem which comes to us with such a terrific toll of suffering and loss.

The second very excellent reply to those asking for information is that the reports of these accidents give an excellent basis for figuring proper rates of accident compensation. The people of Pennsylvania have reached the point where they demand that aid be given those injured in employment. To make a law covering this subject, which will not only be just to the employee but also fair to the employer, much data is required upon which to calculate rates and methods of compensation.

The accident blanks at present distributed by the Department of Labor and Industry have been in use for about a year. In order to find out whether they can be improved upon, so that the methods of collecting accident data may be more effectively carried on, a committee of prominent employers, employees, and statistical experts is being gathered together to meet at the Capitol some time early in July. Such committees form a fine basis for co-operative effort on the part of the State Government and the various parts of the industries themselves.

ORDER MAKING NAVY "DRY"

All Alcoholic Liquors Barred From Every Ship and Shore Station

Washington, D. C., July 1.—Secretary Daniels' order banishing intoxicants from the navy went into effect today. It not only abolishes the traditional "wine mess" of the officers, but bars all alcoholic liquors from every ship and shore station of the navy.

Beginning today any officer found in possession of alcoholic liquor on board ship or at any naval station will be guilty of misconduct. Commanding officers will be held directly responsible for the enforcement of the "dry edict."

Considerable speculation was being indulged in here today as to how officers would accept the new order of things. They were amazed at the time the order was announced in April. Secretary Daniels has said that a reasonable construction was to be placed on the order. This was taken to mean that if any liquor happened to be on board a vessel on foreign service, including those in Mexican waters, a reasonable time would be given in which to unload it.

On all naval reservations and on ships in home waters, however, it was expected, that the lid would be on tight today.

Rabies—Hydrophobia

In commenting upon the many false impressions that exist in the minds of laymen relative to rabies, Dr. C. J. Marshall, State Veterinarian, brought out the following points: "If an animal bites a person, or is suspected to be affected with rabies, the animal should be confined and a qualified veterinarian called. The latter, no doubt, will advise that the animal be kept under observation for a week. If the animal is affected with rabies, it will not recover but the disease will develop rapidly and terminate fatally in less than ten days. For two reasons the animal should not be destroyed until marked symptoms are observed: first, the suspected animal may not be affected with rabies and if allowed to live the person bitten will be greatly relieved; second, the changes upon which a diagnosis is made, in a laboratory, are not usually observed unless the disease is well advanced.

"A person bitten by a dog is not exposed to infection with rabies unless the animal is affected with the disease at the time of the biting. It is an erroneous idea that a person bitten by a dog may develop rabies in seven days, seven weeks, seven months, seven years, or that a person bitten will develop rabies if the dog that bit them should at any time in the future develop the disease, unless the animal shows symptoms within two or three days after the wound is inflicted."
