The occupation tax, which is known in Lancaster as poll tax, aggregates \$9,582.75. The custom for many years has been to assess each married man not a freeholder, 25 cents poll or occupation tax, and each single man, not a freeholder, 50 cents poll or occupation tax. The tax is levied directly, without a valuation on the taxpayers office, trade or occupation, and is not included in the above aggregate of county tax. The value of traction engines is included in the value of carriages.
