FRIDAY NIGHT'S STORM

(Continued from page 1) struck by lightning several months ago and totally destroyed. The new barn taking its place, was only raised the day previous to the above incident. On the farm of John G. Engle, west of Marietta, the road leading from the farm to the river is so badly washed out that it is impossible to drive over it, and it will take tons of macadam to repair it. At the residence of Daniel Fackler at Rowenna, the chicken house was washed from the foundations and was moved near the railroad bridge at that place, being surrounded by hundreds of ties, planks and an immense pile of refuse. At the residence of Elmer Grove, at Maytown, a large tree was blown over by the high wind, and the gardens were badly washed in places by the heavy downpour of rain. At the residence of George H. Roath, in West Marietta, a tobacco patch alongside the house was completely covered with stone and clay, and will have to be cleaned off and replanted. In some of the farming districts above Marietta, corn was washed level to the ground, and in fields where wheat was shocked, the shocks were carried off by the high water and deposited along the banks of the small streams passing thru the farms. The railing on the P. R. R. bridge at Schock's Mills was washed away by the high water there, and the road bed in that vicinity was washed over very badly. The company had over one hundred men there all day Saturday filling up the washout. Carloads of ashes and gravel were used. On the farm of Christian Leese, at Wild Cat, the large metallic spring house was washed from its foundations and carried out on the river road. At this place also the Pennsylvania Railroad tracks were washed out so badly that it will take trainloads of ashes to fill it up. G. Luther Roath, carrier on R. D. 2, from the Marietta postoffice, reported that he had counted over one hundred trees blown down or uprooted by the storm. At the J. E. Baker quarries, at Billmyer, near Bainbridge, the large barn was blown from the foundations and completely demolished.

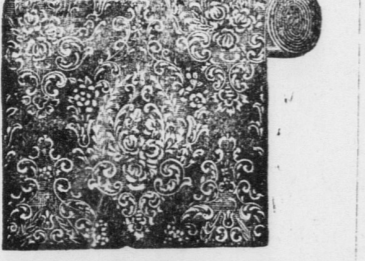
