

... barn ablaze they were unable to get through the rain which was falling so fast as possible for the fire. A mule which was in the stable perished in the flames. The horses were out. A large wagon, seed drill, shredder, two corn shellers, harness, farming tools, and sixty bushels of corn, which was only bought a few days ago, all the sea-son's crops of hay, wheat and oats, the latter only being put in the barn on Friday, all fell a victim to the flames. Sparks were carried more than a mile away, but the heavy downpour of rain saved farm buildings of the sheds from being burned. The corn barn, 20x18 feet, which was attached to the barn, was burned to the ground. A party of four in an automobile who were about to seek refuge under the forbay of the barn which was struck, made a narrow escape from being burned, as the bolt was carried directly in front of the machine. The contents and barn are insured in the Donegal and Conoy Mutual Fire Insurance Company of Lancaster County, the barn being fully covered, which loss will amount to more than \$3,000, and the contents are only partially insured. The loss here will be about \$1,200. The barn was one of the oldest in that section and erected at a point across the road, away from the farm house. Another bolt of lightning struck a large tree on the lane leading from the scene of the fire, which was seen by a number of people and said to be in a direct line through the blaze of the barn, so it would have been struck with either bolt. The Susquehanna River is slowly rising at this point. A bolt of lightning struck a number of trees at the "Point" on the opposite side of the river and several men from Columbia, out fishing, while seeking shelter, were badly shaken up, as the trees fell in front of them across their boat. Benjamin Hoff, man of Conoy township, a man of 83 years, said it was the worst storm he ever experienced.

Hail in Tobacco
The hail has splintered the tobacco and corn in a number of places, and in one of the fields adjoining where there is planted tobacco, one of the crops was ruined by the hail, and the other was not touched. On the Elizabethtown & Maytown turn pike the roads are washed considerably, and a number of fruit trees were felled. Some hail fell about a mile north of Maytown. Evans' run through Marietta was high and Chickies Creek was over the bank. Near the Maytown tollgate the rain was heavy, as on the Hiestand farm, taunted by John Farmer, the water was standing in a lake, which has rained the tobacco.

Barn Burned
The lightning damage was confined to one spot, and struck the barn on the John H. Shank farm on the road leading to Maytown, near Lobata. The farm is tenanted by John Brubaker and the family was away at the time. When the neighbors saw

MISSIONARY AT BILLMYER
Attempt Will be Made to Enlighten Foreigners and Negroes

Plans are under way to establish a Protestant mission in Billmyer. Billmyer is inhabited by foreigners who are employed in the quarries. The movement is being launched by the Marietta Methodist Church. On Sunday Rev. H. H. Potcher, pastor of the church started for Billmyer by auto in company with Barr Spangler, ninety-two years old and a trustee of the Methodist Church. It was their intention to confer with the proper authorities in Billmyer as to the advisability of locating a missionary church. They were unable to reach Billmyer, however, because of the poor roads. Their auto stuck fast in a ditch and it was necessary to get aid from a farm house and pull the auto out with ropes. However, the trustees of the church have been in communication with the Billmyer people since Sunday and action may be taken at the next church meeting.

The greater portion of Billmyer's population is made up of foreigners and negroes. Many of them cannot read and write and the missionary movement, it is hoped, will prove of great benefit to them.

STORM

The supervisor of the township is having stone blasted from the side of the hill to fill up the washout in the roadway which at some places is four or five feet deep. It is well worth this short space in a road that length.

The men were glancing upwards, happy to see the earth moving above and shouted a warning to the panions. Dropping their picks and shovels they all jumped from the ditch. Two seconds afterwards tons of earth filled the spot where they had been working.
