Maytown Man's Touring Car Wrecked on the Columbia Pike

Mr. J. H. Keener, the extensive marble dealer of Maytown, met with an accident on the Columbia pike last Friday evening whereby his car was badly damaged.

Mr. Keener had been in Rohrerstown on business that afternoon and at seven o'clock that evening started for Columbia. He was accompanied by Mr. Levi Hackerty and Mrs. Geo. Hoover both of Rohrerstown.

The machine swerved and ran into the paling fence at the residence of Isaiah Musser, two miles east of Columbia, and was badly damaged.

Mrs. Hoover sustained a compound fracture of her left leg and three of her right ribs were fractured, besides sustaining abrasions to her face and body. Hackerty's right arm is fractured at the shoulder and his left arm is broken above the elbow. Mr. Keener escaped uninjured.

Mrs. Hoover and Mr. Hackerty were treated at the Columbia hospital.
